TEMPERANCE COLUMN.

Edited by Albany W. C. T. U.

California now has five cities under local option rule, namely: Pasadena, Riverside, Tustin, Woodland and El Modena. This speaks volumes for a State, which exports as much wine as California and is a prophecy of the future, in that it shows an awakening of the people to the great evils, directly traceable to the use of the native wine. Thorough work is being done by the W. C. T. U. women and others, in many localities, and we hope to hear of many more of those beautiful cities, being added to this list.

Joseph Cook says: We shall never be able to dethrone the liquor traffic in American politics until we cease to be silent partners in its gains.

The Catholic Total Abstinence Union in 1887, included twenty-two subordinate unions, 754 societies, and a membership of over 50,000. A personal, voluntary pledge is exacted from the members to abstain from all intoxicants for a stated time, to discourage the use of stimulants, and to do all that is possible to destroy the vice of drunkenness.

Cardinal Manning in England and Bishops Ireland and Keane of this country are cited as the leaders in this wide-spread Catholic temperance movement.

The Union does not assume to deal with the legislative aspect of the temperance reform, and is absolutely non-political.

It fills an important place among the influential temperance agencies of our time and country.

Ohio.

The Senate, on the 13th ult., passed the Owens Sunday Closing Bill by a vote of 25 to 2. It takes from councils of municipal organizations the power to decide whether intoxicating liquors shall be sold or not on Sunday, and prohibits all sales of liquor on Sunday.

Illinois.

The Cook County Grand Jury for the month of March, after investigating sundry Chicago murder cases, made the following significant report:

"Our investigation of the murder cases has impressed us to the degree that we deem it our official duty to call the attention of the Court to the following facts in the hope that it may have some little effect on future legislation regarding the liquor traffic: We find that in every case of murder or manslaughter (except one) the cause leading to the crime came direct from the saloon. Furthermore, it came not from the higher and better class of saloons, but from those in the poorer and lower portions of our city, and consequently from the lower grade of saloons. It seems to us that a long step toward solving this problem is a uniform license of \$1,000 payable annually in advance, to be exacted of all saloon-keepers."

The link between the saloon and murder is close. The \$1,000 remedy proposed would quite certainly prove inadequate and disappointing.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Crop Prospects.

ST. PAUL, May 29.—Notwithstanding the fact that rains throughout the Northwest have lately been severe, culminating Sunday in a general downpour, advices indicate that crops have not been in the least injured. Throughout the Red river valley in Northern Dakota and Minnesota, rains were needed. It is estimated that the wheat output in that region will be largely increased, and will reach 50,000,000 bushels.

For Thurman.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—The Examiner will print to-morrow interviews with a large number of leading democrats of the Pacific coast, regarding the feasibility of nominating Judge Thurman, of Ohio, for vice-president on the democratic ticket. The general sentiment seems to be one of enthusiasm in favor of Thurman for the place.

Sheridan.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Midnight—Gen. Sheridan's condition has again changed for the worse, and he is now as critically ill as at any time of his sickness.

TACOMA, May 30.—The first street car company in Tacoma ran its first car through the streets to-day. The tracks have been done for a long time, and the people have been impatiently waiting for the cars to begin running, and last night men were kept at work until a late hour, clearing the tracks and completing the switches. At 4 o'clock this morning the steam motor hitched to a car and successfully climbed from the wharf to the top of the hill.

Extraordinary Rainfall.

DENVER, Colo., May 30.—A marvellous rainfall, which is perhaps at its culmination to-day, has visited Colorado the past few weeks. Never before in the history of the state has one-fifth of such an amount fallen in a similar period. The last week has witnessed a downpour every afternoon, and something over a fortnight ago there was a steady fall of rain for thirty-six hours at a stretch.

A Suit.

SALEM, May 30.—The Silvertown prohibitionists have begun suit in the circuit court to oust from office four of the members of the present council of that city. It will be remembered that the prohibitionists were counted out at the recent election on account of illegal ballots, and the citizens' ticket declared elected.

Drowned.

COLFAX W. T. May 30.—Cornelius Grady, a prominent stock man and rancher on Snake river, while crossing the Penawawa ferry, en route to Walla Walla with a band of cattle, was crowded off the ferry by the cattle and lost his life. His body has not been recovered.
