TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The Oregon and California delegation arrived at St. Louis Thursday, and are said to be solid for Cleveland and Thurman.

Senator Mitchell's joint resolution providing for the appointment by the Secretary of the navy of a commission composed of three competent naval officers, to select a suitable site for a naval station, navy yard and docks on the Pacific Coast, was on Thursday taken up in the Senate, and after being defended by Mitchell, who presented a lengthy letter from the admiral of the navy in its support, was passed.

The Union Pacific R R was threatened with a strike, as the result of recent arrangements allowing the Burlington to run Kansas City, St. Joseph & Council Bluffs night trains over the Union Pacific bridge at Omaha.

The Grant Memorial University, of Athens, Tennessee, at its commencement Thursday, conferred the degree of doctor of laws on Leland Stanford, Senator from California.

The residence of Mrs. Lee Jerome was entered by burglars Tuesday night and \$10,000 worth of diamonds stolen. The inmates of the house were chloroformed. Mrs. Jerome caused a sensation some weeks ago by marrying the head waiter of a hotel. She is worth half a million.

General Sheridan's condition is very critical and he cannot live long.

At the Prohibition National Convention at Indianapolis Thursday Clinton B. Fiske, of New Jersey was nominated for President and John A. Brooks, of Kansas City for Vice President. The woman suffrage plank was nailed into the platform after a stormy debate.

A collision occurred on the Cheyenne & Northern branch of the Union Pacific, near Berdoux, Thursday, between a work train and a passenger engine, which resulted in the death of Passenger Conductor Mayfield, and the probably fatal injury of Engineers Brooks and Marsden, and the serious injury of four other employees.

Word has just been received at Whatcom, W. T., from a reliable source that railroad building to connect Bellingham bay with the Canadian Pacific and Seattle will begin soon.

Seattle is to have a \$2,000,000 steel and iron works.
