Monday the great battle of the ballots will take place. Be careful how you vote.

What does the *Herald* correspondent mean when it says Riley Kirk is the friend of the widow?

Put your ear to the earth next Tuesday night and listen for the election returns from Multnomah, Clatsop and Marion.

With a candidate for a platform the nomination is a declaration. This truth was fully exemplified when the democratic convention nominated Hon. John Burnett for Supreme Judge.

Republicans have labored hard for the last month in this state to convince the voters that it is better to pay high taxes than low taxes, but they have utterly failed in the attempt.

The outrage mill has fallen into decay, but that is no reason why every democrat should not walk up to the polls next Monday and vote for E. E. Davis for Recorder.

It is painful to see a short-legged man trying to wade in deep water, and this reminds us that it is a painful sight to see a republican trying to get elected to an office in a democratic county.

The democratic idea is that national taxes should be for national purposes, and not to make one man rich at the expense of a hundred. If you endorse this think of J. M. Gearin next Monday when you vote, as he believes this too.

J. B. R. Morelock, R. C. Miller and Jeff Myers, democratic candidates for the legislature, are men worthy the support of every democrat in the county. To vote against either one of these men would be voting in favor of Dolph, Hirsch or Williams for the Senate. Don't you do it.

Remember that a vote for Gearin is a vote against the protected monopolies of the country and in the interest of the taxpayers and laborers. Vote as you talk. If you want reduction of taxation vote for Gearin. If you want to keep up high taxes vote for Hermann. The issue is plain and simple.

The eyes of the democrats of the whole country are turned to the democrats of Oregon next Monday. Then democrats of Linn county, buckle on the armor to do your whole duty, not the least of which is to vote for E. E. Montague for County Clerk. Don't forget this important but pleasant duty.

A uniform tariff regulated to the needs of industry and producing a sufficient amount of revenue to meet the just demands of the government economically administered is all the protection which fair minded people can ask, and the people will never be satisfied until it is reduced to that point.
