OBITUARY.—Another pioneer and respected citizen, Levi Fanning departed this life at his home near Albany on the morning of June 5th, 1888. He had been in poor health for some time and yet his death came with quite a shock of surprise. Mr. Fanning was born in Va., Feb. 8th, 1809 his age at the time of his death being 79 years, 3 months and 27 days. When about eleven years of age he removed with his parents to Illinois, soon after to Tenn., where they remained for a short time and returned to Ill., where he remained until he removed to Oregon in 1852, settling in Linn county, where he resided till his demise. After a residence of nearly thirty-six years the verdict of his neighbors is that he was a quiet, honest, upright, christian man, and what greater eulogy could be bestowed. He leaves a companion, three children, and children's children to mourn his loss, but with the assurance that he is resting in peace. His remains were laid to rest in the Albany cemetery, June 7th from the United Presbyterian Church in Albany, followed by a large number of relatives, friends and acquaintances. The funeral sermon was conducted by Rev. H. P. Webb, of the M. E. Church, and Dr. S. G. Irvine, of the U. P. Church. All unite in their sympathy to the relatives. W.

The numerous surveying parties that have been at work on the old survey of the Washington and Idaho, and throughout this whole section, for the past few weeks, have thoroughly aroused the interest of the people along this road and even the papers of Oregon have been making conjectures as to the extension of the O. R. & N. R. into the Coeur de Alene mines and Spokane Falls. There is no longer any doubt that the Washington and Idaho is controlled by Elijah Smith president of the O. R. & N. Co. The surveys of, or the proposed line of the W. & I. road was from Farmington to Spokane Falls and branch at the forks of Hangman Creek and run via the old mission into the Coeur d' Alene mines. It is therefore evident that the O. R. & N. Co. has intended by this disguise to invade the Territory of the Northern Pacific R. R.

The people here have been almost jubilant over the prospect of the monopoly of the Northern Pacific being broken. The Lake Shore & Seattle R. R., which is being built to Spokane Falls will give us communication with Puget Sound, and now that the O. R. & N. Co. have large forces of men at work on the line between Farmington to the terminus of the O. R. N., an Spokane Falls their joy has risen to the highest bound. The first work was commenced on Friday, the first of June, yet it has been pushed with such speed that today, the fifth large force are at work, grading, along the line for twenty miles. Work is progressing very rapidly.

Our interest has also been aroused by the numerous surveys through Oakesdale where the grade stakes have been set and right of way secured. It is supposed that the road will form a junction, with the road from Farmington, at Duch Flat, making two junctions on the line. This road will doubtless be completed in time to haul away our crop, which will be very large, for the prospects for a large crop are very good. C. C. C.
