COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday evening, June 12.

Present all officers but mayor and all members. Councilman Gradwohl in the chair.

Improvements of side and cross walks suggested by the commissioner were ordered made within thirty days, and a motion to build cross walks on Hill, Jefferson, Jackson, Lafayette and Railroad streets, in the eastern part of the city, was adopted.

The committee on streets and public property was directed to view the newly built bridge at the junction of Ninth and Vine streets and accept the same if built according to contract.

A petition from the proprietors of the Revere and Russ houses asking for the revocation of hack licenses on the railroad busses was referred.

A communication was read from Clapp & Jones, the fire engine manufacturers, asking for certain securities for payment of same, and on motion they were ordered given.

Owners of property in block 18 were directed to be notified to connect with the sewer.

Surveyor Barr made a report recommending the change of several grades, and an ordinance was ordered drafted to conform to the same.

In the matter of the petition of W. E. Turrell and others for grading on Seventh street, an order was made requiring the completion of the same within forty days. On motion it was ordered that new bid for the Railroad street sewer be advertised for, to be opened at the next meeting.

Bids for building lateral sewers across Ellsworth and Calipooia street were opened and the contract was let to Jas. Laurent at 70 cents per foot.

The following bills were ordered paid: I. Hays, \$3.33; Will Bros., keys, 1.00; A. B. McIlwan, 3.60; F. M. Westfall, as policeman, 25.50; John Jones, 75; W. B. Barr, surveying, 81; I. Hays, marshal, 183.95; G. M. Westfall, 13.88; N. H. Allen, electric lights, 117.75; W. A. McClain, 50.

Bandana Handkerchiefs.

PROVIDENCE, June 12.—Since the St. Louis nominations the Clyde Print works here have received orders for 2,000,000 bandana handkerchiefs, and have put on 300 extra hands who, with their large force, are working night and day to turn them out. All other goods have been dropped.

Northwestern Notes.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Secretary Vilas has affirmed the decision of the commissioner of the general land office in awarding to Thomas C. Little a tract of land of forty acres in the Lakeview (Oregon) land district.

Patents have been granted as follows: Oregon—Wilton K. Anderson and Ben H. Smith, Wapinita sawmill dog. Washington territory—Robert J. Jones, Carrollton, feathering paddle wheel; William J. Ladd, Colfax, wagon seat. Idaho—Allen Bradford, Wardner, automatic sample apparatus.

A new postoffice was established to-day at Nashville, Benton county, Or., and Jennie C. Curry was appointed postmistress.

Shot.

CASTLE ROCK, Or., June 12.—Dee Matlock shot Al Larkins, at Heppner, yesterday, the ball entering the right side of the neck, just above the collar bone, passing out above the shoulder blade, and barely missing a large artery. Larkin has even chances for getting well. Matlock is at large. Larkin was on crutches at the time, having been hurt by a horse last week.

A Fire at Astoria.

ASTORIA, Or., June 12.—The White Star cannery was totally destroyed by fire at 5:30 this afternoon. The cannery was situated in upper town, a mile and a half from the center of the city. In nine minutes from the sounding of the alarm the Astoria fire department was on the ground with steam fire engines and a hook and ladder cart. Two streams were put on, but a heavy wind was blowing from the west, and the cannery was soon one sheet of flame. The firemen kept the fire from spreading. Thirty feet east of the cannery is the Astoria box factory, with great piles of lumber and a \$30,000 plant; and west and south are dwellings and business houses, but the fire was held where it originated. The building premises, piling, etc., were entirely destroyed.

SOMERSET, Ohio, June 7.—The mother of General Sheridan died to-day.
