THE M. A. T.'S SATURDAY NIGHT.—An Albany saloon-keeper says the Man About Town hasn't any sense, and is a blockhead generally. We hear a great deal about Albany's future. Some of the remarks made are inclined to be wild and exaggerated on the up grade. Others not wild enough. The M. A. T. is not a full fledged enthusiast on anything; but in the matter of Albany's growth he has balloon like ideas to a certain extent. Should the Oregon Pacific be pushed through rapidly our ideas are rather exalted as to the city's growth; and anyway it has an advantage this Saturday night that is bound to make it a fine inland city with a population of not less than ten thousand in five years from now. There are those here who will be saying in a few years, "Well, I was a fool for not buying then." At the end of this rainy week we hear many remarks about too much moisture, but watch for the harvest. An Albany gentleman says his wife has put up about 200 cans of fruit, attacking the cherries by the bushel. Who can surpass this? A large amount of farm machinery has left Albany during the week. The M. A. T. beseeches the owners to keep their machines in out of the rain and well oiled. A binder might just as well be run ten years as to be cast aside in three or four.

THE TOURNAMENTS.—Last evening manager Watts, of the hose team, received a letter from Portland stating that the tournament there will come as announced. The races will be run on Friday and Saturday, June 22 and 23. There will be four horse contests, to-wit: Wet and dry tests, speed race and championship race, and two foot races of one hundred and two hundred fifty yards. The prizes will be large ones and will be announced in Monday's Oregonian. Eight teams, the letter stated, will enter the contests. The Albany team with some difficulty have about secured rooms at Seattle, though the rush there has made them scarce.

TRAMPS.—When the editor of the Kalama paper wrote the following, he was not aware of the fact that Albany had been selected as the objective point by tramps: "Kalama seems to be the objective point for all the tramps on the coast. A SUBSCRIPTION.—A subscription paper is being circulated for a bonus of some where near \$1000 for Mr. Race, the gentleman who recently purchased the St. Charles hotel property, in consideration of which he agrees to repair the building and open a first-class hotel. It is meeting with some encouragement, and if successful will at least have the effect of helping to keep business in the block this side of the hotel. Owners of property there could afford to give liberally.

THE N. P.—The report of the earnings of the Northern Pacific for May shows that the road pays. For that period this year they exceed those of the corresponding month of 1887 by \$447,667.45. Following are the figures: Freight earnings, \$940,000; passenger, \$493,187; miscellaneous, \$93,900; total, \$1,527,087.

MR. RUMOR.—We hope the following from the Yaquina Post has a big bottom to it: Rumor has it that there are some changes being made in the financial management of the O. P. As soon as these are satisfactorily arranged, the business of constructing the road will be resumed. And our informant is sanguine that but a few more days will elapse before there will be lively times at the front.

WATER DITCH.—We are informed that the talk of constructing a water ditch at Lebanon has been revived and the people are quite confident the enterprise will be a success. In case of its success a man from California has agreed to establish a paper mill at that place.

A washout on the O & C in the Siskiyou this morning delayed the overland train ten hours, and the Eugene train took its place from that city this morning.
Several Masons arrived in the city this noon on their way home from the grand lodge at Portland, among others being Hon J. B. Morelock and B. A. Childers, of Brownsville.
The young men who run the barracks have offered a reward of \$10 for the arrest and conviction of the parties who committed the acts of depredation several nights since, an account of which was given in the DEMOCRAT.
Mr Ed Schmeer, son of Johnny Schmeer, arrived in the city yesterday from Crook County. He reports prospects there greatly brightened, though for awhile stock had dry picking and began to look pretty gaunt. It was raining when he left the other side.
As announced in the DEMOCRAT yesterday, Emperor Frederick William, of Germany, is dead, after a reign of only a few weeks. His death occurred at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, and was the cause of great sorrow throughout Europe.
Mr D. G. Clark, of Spokane Falls, arrived in the city this noon, having been in attendance at the meeting of the grand lodge of Masons in Portland, and will remain over Sabbath. Mr Clark says Spokane is the fastest city in the Northwest.
The total membership of the Knights of Pythias in Washington territory is 1700, an increase of 621. The "banner" lodge is Columbia No 8, of Walla Walla. The grand lodge reports \$13,000 in cash and investments. There was paid out for relief \$4000.
The air in and about Chicago is becoming impregnated with Blaineism. His friends do not believe he told the truth when he said he would not accept the nomination, and will push him with the wild hurrah characteristic of that peculiar species of politics. Whether he will be nominated remains to be seen.
Mr. William Wassom, recently from the East, who has been residing near Lebanon, yesterday purchased the Wilson farm near Harrisburg, one of the largest in the county. It consists of 1155 acres and the price was \$13,865. It is stock land mostly and will be used by Mr Wassom for stock raising, an industry we are glad to see pushed in the Valley.
Some chronics complain of hard times in Pendleton. Just you take a walk up any of the hills adjacent, look at the town, and see for yourself the number of new buildings going up in every direction, and we'll venture to say that the hardest times are when you are going up the hill.—E. O. Several who have been in Albany have made such remarks about that city.

ANDENISTOO.—This afternoon Sid Ennis was likewise taken before Justice Humphrey, and received a fine of \$40 for the part he played in the saloon fight. Neither Ennis nor Reed can pay the fines and will have to submit to about a months imprisonment. These two cases should be lessons to the young men of Linn county that they must behave themselves or get the punishment they deserve. Our advice is to keep out of the saloons entirely and you won't get in the grip of the law, which in this case certainly ground out just about the right verdict.

A CLOUD BURST.—Saturday afternoon about 4 o'clock a heavy storm swept over the Klickitat valley, across the river, the edge of it passing over Goldendale. The cloud came from the south, crossing the Columbia near Grants, and another came from the east, the two meeting west of Goldendale near the Happy Home settlement. The result of their meeting was a regular cloud burst, the rain falling in torrents and washing the plowed ground away to the depth of the furrows. On the hillside rocks weighing a ton or more were washed out and into the canyons. Near the mountains hall fell to the depth of from two to four inches, literally chopping the growing grain to pieces. John Cummings lost thirty acres of fall grain, and all that in the area covered by the storm was ruined. The storm exhausted itself in the distance of four miles, and reached at its widest point a distance of two miles.—E. O.
