TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

National Republican Convention.

CHICAGO, June 20.—Tribune and Herald  
say N. Y. delegates will not vote for De-  
pew. Gen. Spaulding, of Mich., says sub-  
committee on platform was adjourned till  
8:30 p. m. Platform will not be reported  
to day.

12:30 p. m. Convention called to order.  
Motion by Roche, of Ill., calling for report  
from organizing committee. Chairman  
announces that credential committee will  
not report until 8 p. m. Convention voted  
to effect permanent organization.

1:05 p. m. Estee briefly referred to Ore-  
gon election. Roche, of Ill., took the  
platform and presented solid silver and  
gold gavel to convention, works of Ill.  
Presented chairman gavel of wood from  
Cesk in a tannery in Galena, belonging to  
Grant. Received with great applause.  
Boyer, of Penn., read report of committee  
on rules and report gave Dakota 10 votes,  
and W. T. 6. Report of committee adopt-  
ed excepting part relating to election of  
alternates. Butlerworth, of Ohio moved  
to limit nominating speeches to fifteen  
minutes. Defeated. Hear moved recess  
to 8 p. m. Carried and convention adjourn-  
ed.

California Fruit.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—At a meeting  
of the executive committee of the state  
board of trade to-day, Mr. Hatch, just re-  
turned from the East, and the demand for  
California fruit was excellent. The first  
two cars of fruit this season sold for \$2350  
a piece. Much interest is reported from  
several sections of the state regarding the  
exhibition for the G. A. R. encampment at  
Columbus, Ohio. The railroad company  
agrees to transport all exhibits to Colum-  
bus and Cincinnati free of charge. Quarters  
in the city hall at Columbus will also be free.

Stanley Probably Dead.

PARIS, June 19.—Advices from Zanzibar  
to Journal des Debats say there is little doubt  
that Stanley is dead. The families of per-  
sons who accompanied the expedition have  
worn mourning for several weeks. It is  
believed Tippoo Tib had taken revenge for  
Stanley's having thwarted him in his ef-  
forts to continue the slave traffic.

Helena Thugs.

HELENA, M. T., June 19.—For nearly  
three weeks Helena has been afflicted with  
a gang of professional burglars, who have  
robbed the residences of citizens with im-  
punity and defied the efforts of the police  
to catch them. No less than thirty houses  
have been raided during that time without  
disturbing the occupants.

Rick Lead Strike.

LEBANON, Mo., June 19.—Mr. L. W.  
Burriss, Postmaster at Alman, Hickory  
county, about thirty-five miles northwest  
of here, was in this city to-day exhibiting  
some rich specimens which he took from a  
shaft he has sunk on his premises near the  
Little Niague river. He said that in a  
shaft four by six feet and twenty-eight feet  
deep he raised over 20,000 pounds of ore  
like the samples exhibited, which will yield  
not less than 5 per cent of pure lead. At  
twenty-eight feet he tapped a vein of water  
on a cap rock, and was forced to resort to  
drilling. It is certainly the richest lead in  
this county.

Again Arrested.

PORTLAND, Or., June 19.—W. G. Emery,  
until recently bookkeeper for Dayton &  
Hall, of this city, was arrested this morning  
on charge of embezzlement. The books  
have been partially examined, and it is al-  
leged that so far, the shortage foots up four  
thousand dollars. In the police court to-  
day, Emery waived examination and was  
placed under four thousand dollar bonds.

Newspaper Sensation.

MACON, Ga., June 19.—The Macon News,  
an intensely democratic paper, created a  
sensation yesterday by publishing a head-  
line at the top of the editorial columns,  
"The leading republican paper." What  
gave the announcement effect was the fact  
that the paper had violently assailed the  
free trade plank in the democratic plat-  
form. The obnoxious line resulted in sud-  
den curtailment of subscriptions, which  
brought the matter immediately before  
the directors of the paper. An investiga-  
tion proved that a malicious printer had in-  
serted it surreptitiously.
