For a quarter of a century we have maintained the highest tariff in the world on the pretense that it nourished our industries and kept up the wages of labor. Under that tariff we have had the worst panics and the severest industrial and business prostrations that ever afflicted this country.

WALLA WALLA, June 21.—A license was issued yesterday for the marriage of a member of the Second cavalry band and a young woman, the divorced wife of a paymaster's clerk in the United States army, who is now stationed at San Francisco. The young lady, since her desertion by her husband, has been living with her mother in this city. The wedding was to take place last night. When the would-be groom went to carry away his intended bride, he found her locked in her room and a male member of the family on guard with a gun.

A Big Sale. NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 21.—Jonathan Bourne, Jr. of this city, about a year ago purchased a gold mine near Summer, Oregon, for something over \$24,000. A few weeks after \$150,000 was offered him for a quarter interest, but refused. After working the mine some time he has disposed of the property to a company, mainly of St. Louis capitalists, for \$1,150,000 cash and \$4,000,000 stock. Experts estimate a profit of \$60,000 per month can be made out of the mine.
