ANOTHER BOLT.

The Providence, Rhode Island, *Journal*, for many years the great leading republican journal of that state, bolts the republican ticket and says this:

"The *Journal* believes that upon this question (the tariff issue) the democratic policy and platform are right and the republican policy and platform are wrong. It had hoped that the party in convention would declare for a reasonable revision of the tariff in the line of a reduction in the cost of the necessities of life, the relief of manufactures, a more open market and a practical revival of our commerce. It has not done so. The democratic party has. It is a question of national policy overshadowing all others. The *Journal* is not blind to the shortcomings of the Administration of President Cleveland. But it must take things as it finds them, choosing what it believes to be the right side of the main issue, preferring principle to party, practical wisdom to local popularity, and standing for what it believes to be the best welfare of the whole country."

KEEP IT BEFORE THE PEOPLE.

The following taken from a paper published in one of the interior counties of New York shows that the people are looking into Harrison's Chinese record east as well as west:

"While in the U. S. Senate Harrison voted fourteen times against the restriction of Chinese immigration."

Let every democratic paper in the state keep this fact before the people.

Heavy Odds on Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The statement is made, on the authority of Mr. Dalton, postmaster of the house of representatives, that more than \$100,000 is now available at the federal capitol to be wagered upon the election of Cleveland and Thurman. Congressman Tim Campbell of New York is authorized by a political club in New York city to bet \$25,000 on Cleveland's election, at odds of \$100 to \$60. A number of democratic congressmen in the house have also signified their desire to make individual wagers of from \$5000 to \$10,000 each, at substantially for foregoing odds.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Last week Senator and Mrs. Dolph gave a dinner of fourteen covers in honor of delegate Barin of Oregon. Other guests present were: Senator Mitchell, Representative Hermann, Gen. and Mrs. O. G. Greene, Mr. and Mrs. Nixon, Mr. and Mrs. Gilfrey and George B. Hazleton. The occasion proved an enjoyable one, as the hospitalities of the Senator and his attractive wife ever do. Senator Dolph thinks of taking his family to Kentucky for the summer months, leaving here in a week or so. Mrs. Dolph expects, however, to go to Oregon in the early fall months, and the family will not be likely to return here next season for the short session.

Campaign Notes

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The campaign committee of the national democratic committee will this week elect speakers for the campaign. The battle ground in New York, California, Oregon, New Jersey and Indiana will be thoroughly covered by able and entertaining orators. Among them in the Eastern states, will be the "Old Roman" himself, and it is stated that he will go to the Pacific coast.
