LOCAL RECORD.

THE 4TH.—There was nearly a higer of Albany on the occasion of the annual screech of the eagle. The trains from this city took people to Portland, Yaquina Bay and Corvallis, and already a large number were in Seattle. The biggest crowd went to Corvallis drawn by the O. N. G. program. That city was packed full of people, from all quarters of the Valley and Benton county, among the number present being a DEMOCRAT man with a dull pencil. Probably six or seven thousand people were there. At about ten o'clock a parade was given headed by a liberty car, full of little girls representing the states, which was followed by the six military companies present, the Eugene and Corvallis bands, etc. At the Court House the procession stopped. A man read an article beginning "we the people of the United States" and Judge McFadden delivered the oration. The corner stone of the new Court House, which promises to be the best in the State was laid, Judge Kelsay delivering a startlingly brilliant address on the occasion of the ceremony. At 2 o'clock the drill and sham battle by companies from Corvallis, Salem, Eugene, acelay, Whiteaker and Albany began. The ground was peculiarly adapted to the purpose, being the open place near Mary's bridge. The sham battle was well planned and was carried out in a manner to excite the immense concourse of people that lined the commons and crowded forward to witness the spectacle. Near the bank of the river on the rise of ground were breast-works and a cannon. It was held by three companies. In the middle of the field is a gulch. The attacking force was on the north, while along the gulch on the south was a line of pickets. The rattle of the musketry, the attacking and retreating made a live exhibition. Finally a squad of men surprised the enemy in the rear, a combined attack was made from the front by the way of a plank across the area of the gulch, and the enemy was theirs amid much enthusiasm. We were particularly proud of the Albany company during the entire celebration, and all of the militia conducted themselves in a creditable manner. A horse race on the main street followed, Albany and Salem making picked up teams in order to have a contest. The time all around was slow. It even took the Corvallis team in tight 37 seconds to run less than a hundred yards, unrel 150 feet of hose and get water. Albany was 45 1/4 seconds, and Salem 42 1/4. In the evening a dance was had at the city hall. At 11 o'clock the train left for home, several being obliged to remain for want of standing room. Those who went to Portland report an immense time, and the Bay people at least plenty of sea breezes. The weather was uncommonly fine for the 4th of July.

MR. MORRIS, who attended the celebration at Scio says a big time was had, an immense sight of life being displayed. S. T. Richardson, of Salem, delivered the oration.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.—The State Agricultural College at Corvallis has been formally turned over to the State of Oregon and is now in a solid financial condition, with a magnificent College building, and the following excellent corps of instructors, just elected: B. L. Arnold, President; E. Grimm director of the experiment station and also professor of agriculture; F. Berchtold, modern language, latin and drawing; W. W. Bristow, preparatory and commercial departments, farming accounts and bee culture; J. D. Letcher, late of Virginia Military Institute, professor of mathematics, civil engineering and surveying; W. N. Hall, of Cedar Falls, Iowa, commercial and farming law, elocution, mechanical drawing, history and geography. Geo. Goote was appointed foreman of horticulture. A DEMOCRAT man met Prof. Letcher at Corvallis, a cultivated gentleman, who spoke very encouragingly of the prospects of the College there in its new field.

DISCHARGED.—Ed. Abbey, son of Pete Abbey, who went with his father to San Diego, Cal., a short time ago, to clear away any suspicion of arson resting on him, has been heard from. It will be remembered that his restaurant at San Diego burned down, and that he was suspicioned burning it for the insurance money. At trial he proved himself entirely innocent and was discharged from custody.—Times.

FROM PRINEVILLE PAPERS.—Mrs. Sarah Smith died in Crook county last week. She was born in Brownsville, Linn county, July 15th, 1858, and was therefore, at the time of her death, aged 29 years, 11 months and 13 days. She was married Nov. 7th, 1877. She and her husband moved to this county in October, 1880. The next Oregon legislature will be like Prineville in one respect; it won't have any preachers in it. S. G. Wood, of Willow Creek, started about 400 head of cattle for Owyhee, Tuesday. Mr. Wood has been in the cattle business here for the past 15 years, and is now compelled to seek other range for his stock. The band boys received a new tuba from below by Tuesday's stage. It is a fine instrument, and with Charlie Elkins furnishing the wind power, it will make the welcoming on the 4th. Hay will not be worth more than \$3 per ton this season, though that price is much better for the country than if it were \$20 and hay was scarce. Abe Hackleman was in from his ranch on Thursday. He says the grass and grain prospects in the southern part of the county were never better than at present.

ANOTHER SHOOTING ACCIDENT.—On Jan Tuesday two sons of John Minnace, living on the north side of the South Santiam river, opposite Sweet Home, were out hunting berries haying a 44 calibre gun with them. The younger boy, 11 years old, was some distance from his brother and in attempting to pull the heavy gun upon a log on which he was standing, the gun was discharged, the ball entering his head near the ear and coming out at the crown of the head. At last accounts the boy was alive, but Dr. Courtney, who was called to see him, said he could not live.

AMPUTATED.—Yesterday morning Drs. Maston and Walla ce amputated the leg of Fred Davis, who was accidentally shot on Tuesday. The right leg was taken off just below the knee. It seems that the musket was an old one, and had been loaded for a long time. Dougherty and Davis were trying to snap a cap on it, but it refused to go off. It was placed on the porch, and went off from fire that had been lingering in the dampened powder. Davis's leg was shattered in a fearful manner.

ACROSS THE CASCADES.—Mr. Abe Hackleman arrived in Albany from his Crook County ranch this morning, accompanied by his son Frank. Coming down the Seven Mile hill agrouse flew up and frightened his team, one of which was a young horse. They shied and sprang forward, going over a log, and down a steep embankment. The wagon and horses lodged against a tree while Mr. Hackleman was thrown about sixty feet down the embankment to the bottom. Fortunately he received no injuries, and Frank came out uninjured. The whistle tree was broken and that was about the extent of the damage. The accident was not the result of the condition of the road, which Mr. Hackleman says is good. Crops in Crook county are looking fine and stock is in excellent condition.

RAISED.—Under the new adjustment of the salaries of postmasters made by the Postmaster General, the salary of the postmaster at Albany has been raised from \$1500 to \$1600. The salaries are based on the gross receipts of the office for the year. Had the gross receipts at this office been \$70 more the salary would have been \$1700.

DRUMMING CONTEST.—The long talked of drumming contest between Maj. Heider-shot, the drummer boy of the Rappahamock and Capt. Elston, took place at Helena, Mon. yesterday and was won by the former, who received a credit of eight points out of ten.
