It is both interesting and significant to see such subservient organs as the Philadelphia Press, New York Tribune, Oregonian and others of like ilk, grasping out in all directions like drowning men to save themselves and their party from such heavy loads as their free whisky platform and Harrison's Pro-Chinese record. One of the latest of these antics is that of the Indianapolis Journal, Harrison's own personal organ. The Journal has been busy denying charges of Gen. Harrison's opposition to organized labor and to the restriction of Chinese immigration. It declares that he was not opposed to restriction, his vote against the restriction bills being solely on the ground that the treaty was the obstacle. On March 28th, 1882, the Journal was under its present management, and was, as now, the organ of Gen. Harrison. On that day it said editorially:

"They who shout, 'the Chinese must go,' are as mistaken as the dweller on the Yazoo who stands upon the banks and curses the father of waters. Repulsed from our shores, the Chinese flood will pour into Peru, into the South Sea Islands, into Spain, into Cuba, into Mexico—to even lower levels. But finally he will overspread districts whose inhabitants have miscalculated the extent and insight of the flood. His virtues are sobriety, modesty, patience and economy, and he is a teacher to the labor of all lands. Whatever his faults, his lesson must be learned by the strikers and grumblers everywhere, for none other has so successfully met and triumphed over the hardest conditions of life. He is a wonder and a marvel, an astonishment and a surprise, but a warning and an admonition as well."

Just a week after the publication of this editorial Gen. Harrison voted against the Chinese Restriction bill in the Senate. These organs are having a hard time of it, but there is none whose awkward predicament causes it to worry so much as the Oregonian.

A dispatch from Grand Rapids, Michigan, to the New York World, says: "Local political circles are discussing the open declarations of Dr. C. S. Haseltine, Wm. Widdcomb, G. M. Lemon and Joseph Martin that they will vote for Cleveland. They have been staunch republicans, and have stood high in social and political circles. Widdcomb was the republican candidate for Mayor six years ago. They say they cannot stand the republican platform, and have great admiration for President Cleveland's business administration. The announcement made by these gentlemen has greatly agitated the republican politicians. As told in The World a few days ago, the free whisky plank in the Chicago platform has given cold shivers to many a temperance republican who has stuck to his party because he thought more practical temperance legislation could be obtained from it than from the smaller prohibition party. Any considerable defection of such republicans, either to the prohibitionists or the democrats, would make the state democratic. Even republican managers do not claim it by more than 5000. Such a defection, if once started, would probably be widespread."

And now they say that when the Mills bill goes to the Senate, after its passage in the house, that body will substitute a bill of their own for it. It is said this substitute will remove one-half the duty from sugar and put several articles on the free list. The tax on tobacco will be removed. Now we protest that such a bill would be an open, contemptuous slap in the face of the Chicago platform, and it would be worse than that, it would be an out-and-out free trade document. The idea of the republican Senate putting articles on the free list in response to the demands of the Cobden Club and under the direct influence of British gold. Our protected industries will all be ruined, boo, hoo-hoo.

A private letter from an old friend of the editor of this paper who has been in Washington city many years, says: "The democrats here have strong hopes of success in the coming election; a great majority believing the race will be an easy one to win. The wagers so far laid on the result, particularly in New York, are largely in favor of Cleveland's election."

Yesterday while the Mills bill was before Congress a vote was taken to strike wool from the free list and thus restore the duty as now provided for. The motion was lost by a vote of 120 to 110.

A correspondent suggests the following as an "old saw" republicanism: "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, The saddest are these, 'We can't have Ben.'"

As we understand it, Mr. Harrison is in favor of building a Chinese wall around the United States that will keep out pretty much everything except the Chinese.

The democrats will tip-a-canoe into the Wabash Canal next November.
