The Oregon Blade, speaking of Harrison's Chinese record, says that "he supported the Chinese restriction bill when the terms of the treaty were so modified as to admit of the passage of such a measure consistent with national honor and honesty, and that he never worked and voted for a bill for giving the Chinese the ballot." Harrison did not support the Chinese restriction bill when the treaty was modified nor at any other time. We challenge the Blade to refer to the page and date where Harrison ever voted for any restriction bill. We assert without any fear of successful contradiction whatever, that every vote of Harrison's on that subject recorded in the Congressional Record is against the restriction bill in all its stages. Again we call upon the Blade to name the date and page of the Record where Harrison is recorded as voting for any Chinese restriction bill. He voted against the bill that finally became a law. Let the Blade show its authority or never falsify the fact again.

We have been repeatedly told that when Harrison ran for Governor in Indiana in 1876 he ran from 2000 to 4000 ahead of his ticket. This is told to impress the public mind that he is popular in his own state. Records, like facts, are stubborn things, and the records show the following vote in Indiana in 1876. Hayes for president received 208,011 votes. Harrison for governor received 208,080 votes. Tilden for president received 213,526 and "Blue Jeans" Williams for governor received 213,164. This shows that Harrison received 77 votes more than Hayes and this is the way he ran ahead of his ticket. These figures are taken from the Tribune Almanac and the Annual Statistician. One by one the republican campaign booms burst and spread out into thin nothingness.

Republican campaign orators in Delaware county, Pa., have struck a snag in the person of Benjamin C. Potts, a large manufacturer of woolen goods near Media. Mr. Potts has challenged the principal speakers at a recent ratification meeting in Media to discuss the tariff question with him. There ought to be more of this sort of thing. The woolen manufacturers who appreciate low tariff duties as a help to business, are daily increasing in number, and the missionary work of Mr. Potts will not be the last of its kind that will be carried on in the citadel of protection.

The Mills bill passed the House Saturday by a vote of 162 to 149. Those voting in favor of the bill were 156 democrats, three labor members, (Anderson of Iowa, Hopkins of Virginia and Smith of Wisconsin,) and three republicans, (Fitch of New York, Nelson of Minnesota and Brower of North Carolina.) Those voting against the bill were 145 republicans and four democrats (Bliss, Merriman and Greenman of New York, and Sowden of Pennsylvania.)

The Mountaineer says: "The attitude of Gen. Harrison on the Chinese question has been endorsed by all honest and honorable men in the country." This is a shameless misstatement of the truth and no intelligent, truthful person would make the statement. Harrison uniformly and unvaryingly voted against all Chinese restrictive measures introduced into the United States Senate while he was a member of that body and there are millions of honest, honorable people who do not endorse his course. He who does is a friend of Chinese cheap labor and Chinese citizenship.

Last year there were imported \$42,000,000 worth of woolen goods upon which a duty of \$29,000,000 or an average duty of 69 1/4 cents on every dollar's worth of the goods. The people who wore out these goods actually paid this enormous tax of \$29,000,000 on \$42,000,000 worth of goods. Here is food for thought.

The Cleveland Plain Dealer (Dem.) says: "There was never such a thing known in this country as a railroad monopoly or a trust until the Republican party forced its policy of tax robbery upon the country. This unjust policy has centralized business and capital and forced out competition among small manufacturers."

"In 1884 Cleveland promised not to run again if elected, while both parties made vague promises of cutting down the surplus, which continues to cut up as usual, notwithstanding."—Pioneer.

This they hold is the first essential step to prohibition throughout the entire country. The republicans say they will repeal the tax in order to reduce the surplus in the treasury of the United States and at the same time prevent a reduction of the duty on the necessities of life. The republicans want to give their pet war tariff and the prohibitionists want to abate the whisky evil.
