Editor's Democrat:

It is sad, indeed, to see an organ that professes to be the friend and mouth piece of the farmers, and especially the granger or Patron element of agriculturists, debasing its columns with such misrepresentations as appear from time to time in the columns of the *Herald* in regard to the message of the president of the United States on a question in which farmers, grangers and laborers are more greatly interested than any other class of our people, sneering at it as "President Cleveland's free trade message," expecting the class of people whom he claims to represent to accept what its editor, through his blind partisan zeal, dishes out to them as truth without any comparison of these partisan and untruthful assertions with the message itself. These unfair and unjust assertions are conclusive in the minds of Patrons of only one thing—that is the editor of the *Herald* is willing to sacrifice the interest, welfare and usefulness of the order of Patrons of Husbandry to subserve his partisan interests and that his party fealty is paramount to his fealty to the order he professes to represent. In proof of this I simply call the attention of Patrons to the fact that the *Herald* uses continually the unfair "catch phrases" of such blind, partisan organs as the *Oregonian* in speaking of the president's message as a "free trade message," when that message expressly says: "It is not proposed to entirely relieve the country of this taxation. It must be extensively continued as the source of the Government's income; and in a readjustment of our tariff the interests of American labor engaged in manufacture should be carefully considered, as well as the preservation of our manufacturers. It may be called protection, or by any other name, but relief from the hardships and dangers of our present tariff laws should be devised with especial precaution against imperiling the existence of our manufacturing interests." Again the president says: "But the reduction of taxation demanded should be so measured as not to necessitate or justify either the loss of employment by the working man nor the lessening of his wages; and the profits still remaining to the manufacturer, after a necessary readjustment, should furnish no excuse for the sacrifice of the interests of his employees either in their opportunity to work or in the diminution of their compensation." Again the president says: "It is a condition which confronts us—not a theory. Relief from this condition may involve a slight reduction of the advantages which we award our home productions, but the entire withdrawal of such advantages should not be contemplated. The question of free trade is absolutely irrelevant; and the persistent claim made in certain quarters, that all efforts to relieve the people from unjust and unnecessary taxation are schemes of so-called free traders, is mischievous and far removed from any consideration for the public good." Now if the *Herald* wishes us to understand that he is a partisan republican, committed to the doctrine enunciated in their platform, namely, free whisky, free tobacco and free oleomargarine, rather than cheap necessities of life, and to the support of a candidate whose votes and acts in the Senate prove him to be in favor of the unrestricted influx of Chinese to this country as well as their admission to citizenship, all of which militates against the interests of farmers and laborers, let him say so, and not profess to be the friend and mouthpiece of an organization whose interests are diverse to that of trusts, combines and monopolies which governed and controlled in the body that enunciated the doctrine of free whisky and dear clothing.

GRANGER.

If anything were necessary to show the very remote chances which the shrewd republican leaders think they have of electing Harrison, that proof is supplied in the depths to which the republican press are sinking in order to find something to break down the democratic campaign. Sunday's *Oregonian* has a dispatch stating that the *New York Mail and Express* has started a story that a gentleman just from England says that ten million dollars has been raised there to help elect Cleveland. The whole story is of course a manufactured lie prepared by some one who is deeply anxious to help elect Harrison, and the very accommodating Associated Press true to its subserviency in the republican cause flashes it all over the country. It will be published in all the country newspapers and hundreds of thousands of people will be made to believe such improbable stories. But can a republican president be elected upon such a system of falsehoods? We shall see.

The republican majority in the Senate is getting ready to desert the platform of their party adopted at Chicago. The platform declares: "We favor the entire repeal of internal taxes (that is the tax on whisky tobacco and bull butter,) rather than the surrender of any part of our protective system." But now it is said the majority of the Senate finance committee, who are holding star chamber meetings to which the democratic members are not admitted, have decided to surrender the "protective system" to the extent of twenty-nine million dollars on sugar and several other "surrenders" which will appear later on. Of course no one expected the republican leaders to stand by and defend their platform, if they found it necessary to desert it, but no one thought they would desert it so openly before the election. It was expected that they would dodge around and evade the whole matter until after election, when they could violate their platform with impunity as they did their platform in 1884, but it was not expected that in the heat of a campaign they would desert the issue they made themselves. The people have their eyes on these leaders.
