TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Diamonds.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—A well known lady of this city reported to the police lately the loss of over \$6000 worth of diamonds. Several weeks ago, before going into the country, she left the gems in charge of her daughter. The latter became apprehensive at the thought of so much wealth being entrusted to her care, so she hid the stones in the bottom of an old coal hod, filled with ashes. The cook, not knowing this, emptied the hod into the ash barrel, which was carried off and dumped into a garbage pile. A ragpicker, pulling over the garbage, discovered a diamond brooch worth \$2500, which he sold for \$10 to a saloon keeper, who was wearing it when the detectives found it. The ragpicker has not yet sufficiently recovered from his stupor to explain his find.

Beer Glasses.

WALLA WALLA, July 31.—D. J. Hickey was brought up from Wallula this morning, seriously, if not fatally injured, from the effects of a beating with beer glasses in the hands of two barkeepers named John Doe and Ed Reed. Both were arrested.

Lightning.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Guests at the Palmer house were startled in their sleep this morning by a terrific clap like thunder, accompanied by a very perceptible shock in all parts of the house. Thoughts of dynamite bombs and earthquakes caused nearly all the guests to hurriedly dress and crowd pell-mell through the corridors. Meantime the few passers on the streets were kept busy dodging flying splinters of timber. The flagstaff on the northwest corner of the building was found shattered to slivers by lightning. Ropes were quickly stretched across the sidewalk to keep pedestrians out of possible danger of some huge cornice falling. Investigation showed, however, that the actual damage done by the bolt was very slight, notwithstanding the genuine scare given the hundreds of people in the hotel.

A Chinese Divorce Suit.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The first Chinese divorce suit ever recorded on this coast was filed in the county clerk's office to-day. Fung Lee seeks a dissolution of the bonds between herself and Chan Lee, on the ground that prior to their marriage, in Sacramento, in 1885, Chan had married another woman, who was still in existence at the time of the second ceremony, and furthermore, that he has since deserted complainant.

A Big Price.

LEXINGTON, Ky., July 31.—The sale of Bell Boy to-day, at the farm of T. G. Jefferson, drew a large crowd of turmen from sections of the country, including David Bonner of New York, K. C. Seaman of San Diego, J. C. Clark of Elmira, N. Y., Simon Gross, Phil Grist of Boston, and others. The bidding was started by J. S. Clark at \$20,000, followed by Seaman at \$21,000. These two were the only bidders, and when \$49,000 was bid Clark quit. Seaman bidding \$50,000, which is the highest price ever paid for a horse in the world.

A Circus Panic.

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 31.—While Barnum's circus was giving an exhibition here to-day, a terrific wind and rain storm came up and threatened to carry away the large tent. A panic ensued, and many persons were injured in their frantic efforts to escape. Particulars are not known.

A Noted Mason Dead.

LOUISVILLE, July 31.—Dr. Robert Morris died this morning at his home in Lagrange from paralysis, aged 70 years. Morris was the poet laureate of Masonry and the most distinguished Mason in the world.
