If a man stated that a tariff of 42 per cent was a free trade tariff at any other time than during a political campaign, the world would set him down as a fool or an unmitigated liar.

Between now and November the following state elections will be held: Alabama, August 6; Arkansas, September 5; Maine, September 10; Georgia, October 3.

The poorest paid wageworkers in the United States are those engaged in manufacturing goods "protected" by high tariff laws. The assertion cannot and will not be denied.

A republican business man of Evansville, Ind., writes a friend that "if it were not for the fool laboring man and the d-d prohibitionists, I think we could carry the state for Harrison and Morton, but with these two classes of idiots in the way I am fearful we will lose Indiana."

The Chicago *Inter-Ocean* is one republican paper that does not try to dodge the issue or explain away the Chicago platform. It is out plumply for abolishing all internal revenue taxation. That means free whisky, free tobacco and free oleomargarine.

Thos. Nast, the great caricaturist who visited Albany last winter, made a call at the headquarters of the National democratic committee in New York last week and had a long conference with Chairman Brice, exhibiting some excellent cartoons drawn in the interest of Cleveland's election.

The *Advocate*, published at Newark, Ohio, prints a picture of a Chinaman with the ever present wooden shoe and long pendent queue, with the following printed beneath: "Me washee bloody shirtee for republican office alle time—alle velly nastee—worse lan leprosee—Cappce foullee—Ickee smellee bad—alle nastee foullee—makee me sickee."

Harrison is wrong on the Chinese question, and every workingman in this country knows it. In 1877 he was against the railroad strikers. When he was in the Senate we put bills in his care. He had them referred to committees, and that was the last ever heard of them. At the time of the senatorial canvass there was not a labor organization that did not denounce him.—Andrew I. The Republicans in 1883 proposed to reduce the tariff on an average of 20 per cent, but finally reduced it about 5 per cent. The Democrats now propose to reduce it on an average about 7 per cent. And still the Democrats are called free traders for attempting to reduce the tariff one-third what the Republicans proposed to reduce it five years ago. The Republicans have shifted grounds now, at the dictation of their masters, the monopolistic trusts.

The Dayton, Ohio, *Workman*, the labor organ of that state, says: "Workingmen by voting with the democratic party now have it in their power to down monopoly, which is now championed by the republican party, not by choice but by force of circumstances. The man is an idiot, fool or knave who is not willing to see a reduction of tariff duties in this country, when that reduction will benefit nine out of every ten, and the tenth man will not be wronged, but this iniquitous tariff system is wronging the nine."

"The golden opportunity is never offered twice; seize, then, the hour when fortune smiles, and duty points the way." This advice is just as applicable in the material affairs of mankind as in religion or morals. The golden opportunity comes once to a city as an individual. Albany's opportunity is upon us. Will we then seize the advantages of this opportunity and place our town in the broadway to permanent progress and growth? The unerring finger of duty points the way. Let the citizens of the town arouse from their lethargy and start the wheels rolling.

Connecticut republicans are excited over the position taken by the Windham County *Standard*, heretofore a republican paper. The *Standard* has the largest circulation of any paper in the county and announces that it shall support Cleveland and tariff reform. It says editorially: "Mr. Cleveland stands for equal and reduced taxation, Mr. Harrison, on the other hand, stands for high taxation, (higher, if necessary,) and free whisky and tobacco. By these issues the candidate must stand or fall. With due respect for Mr. Harrison, we conscientiously believe President Cleveland is right, and accordingly shall support him."

WAGES AND TAXATION.

If high tariff makes high wages in this country it ought to do the same in other countries. Mexico has a higher tariff than this country has. Therefore, according to our thimblebrag logicians, wages should be higher in Mexico than here. But the fact is that wages are not half as high in Mexico as here. Germany has a tariff for protection and England has not. Therefore, according to these logicians, wages should be higher in Germany than in England. But what is the fact? Let us learn from high tariff authority. The Commissioner of Labor Statistics for the state of Maine, which is the state of Blaine, is a zealous defender of the 47 per cent war tariff. In his last report this official gives the following tabulated statement of wages in certain trades in England and Germany:

According to the theory that high tariff makes high wages, workmen should get a good deal more in Germany than in England. But according to this table they get almost exactly 77 per cent more in England than in Germany.
