NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

The editor of the *Herald* was seen to turn into a rarely used alley yesterday morning and pick up a cast-off weather beaten copy of last month's *Chronicle* and carry it, hugged to his bosom as a precious treasure, to his office. The public may look out next week or the week after for an article on the tariff question, not including the whisky plank in the Chicago platform.

Max Baumgart is noted for dry humor. Unfortunately his hearing is not good. Yesterday he passed by a couple of his friends standing on the street talking. Max stopped and said to one in the most serious manner: "Is Harrison dead?" Both gentlemen answered in the same breath, "No, why?" Max, pointing in the direction of a couple of men with Harrison hats on, replied: "Well, what are those fellows in mourning for?" (The Harrison hat has a very broad black band.)

The course of this paper has always been for a full and fair revision of the tariff.—*Herald*.

A statement of that kind does not define your attitude on the tariff question. A person who reads your statement above knows no more about your views of the tariff question since reading it than he did before. A "revision" means simply an "alteration" or "amendment" of the present law. To increase the duties on one or more articles would be a "revision." To make a uniform increase on all articles would be a "revision." To increase on some and reduce on the others would be a "revision." What farmers and laboring people would like to know is, whether you favor putting wheat sacks and twine, lumber and salt on the free list.

You remember how the republican papers denounced the democratic members of the ways and means committee of the House for holding secret, private caucuses when formulating the Mills bill. They were criticised in the severest language for not admitting the minority of the committee to these caucuses. Of course the minority was always admitted to the regular meetings of the committee. Now, the tables are turned. The tariff bill is before the Senate finance committee, a majority of which are republicans. The majority is now holding secret conclaves to which not a single democrat is admitted. Not only this but when the time for a regular meeting of the committee arrives the republicans all stay away so no meeting can be held. Why do not the *Oregonian* and other organs stand up and denounce this outrageous conduct. These organs are mute as mice, for it is the democratic ox that is now gored.

The republican convention was held at Chicago in a building erected by non-union labor, and it is claimed that the Central Labor Union, if consistent, must declare against the republican candidates. The Central Labor Union protested against the holding of the convention in the Auditorium Building. A report has now been made on the subject by a special committee of the United Carpenters' Council, of Chicago. This same committee had waited on the republican party managers and endeavored to induce them to hold their convention in some other hall. The committee says in its report that it has been "trifled with and humbugged and labor's interests contemptuously ignored by these managers of the republican party." Incidentally the report mentions the fact that President Cleveland had declined to lay the corner stone of the building. The report was accepted and made a part of the council's record.

The question which the election of this year submits to the country is not a question of protection and free trade, but of the degree of protection. One platform declares distinctly that, rather than diminish the surplus by moderating the tariff, the national tax on whisky should be repealed. The other platform proposes to cheapen the necessities of life, to stimulate industry and to extend trade by freeing the raw materials of manufacture. It assumes that the prosperity of the country is not due to high taxes in the form of an immoderate tariff, but to the superior skill, enterprise, thrift and energy of the people. By freeing salt it supplies cheaply a universal necessity and disturbs a grasping monopoly. By freeing wool it cheapens clothes for everybody. Six hundred million pounds of wool are required to make our clothes in this country, and we do not raise half that quantity. More than \$44,000,000 worth of woollen goods are imported annually, at an average duty of 58 per cent. Free import of wool would permit the manufacture of these goods in this country so cheaply that the import would cease. The demand for labor would increase enormously, with consequent increase of wages and extension of trade, with cheaper clothing and carpets.

The Democratic leaders in Illinois expect to gather a great deal of strength from the Labor party this year. The Labor men in Cook County held several secret conferences last week to decide upon their course in the election. They pretty unanimously concluded to support Cleveland and Thurman and the Democratic State ticket. They will run independent tickets for the State Legislature and in the Senatorial Districts, where they have a considerable foothold. They elected seven Representatives and one Senator two years ago. Charles G. Dixon, candidate for Lieutenant-Governor on the State Labor ticket, has withdrawn, and will support the Democratic ticket. His defection leaves only one candidate on the Labor ticket, Jones, for Governor. He is likely to be withdrawn.

The campaign in Illinois opened yesterday with 1000 meetings in that many cities, towns, villages and public places. This demonstration will in a few days be followed by county mass meetings, and these in turn by meetings in the twenty congressional districts of the state, to be held on the same evening, and to be addressed by able tariff reform congressmen with special reference to congressional issues. The fourth and last chapter of this vast educational scheme will consist of a series of state meetings held in the principal cities and centers of population, at which General Palmer, the Democratic candidate for governor, and speakers of national reputation will discuss state and national issues.

Bishop Vincetn, leisuring and pleasuring at Chautauqua, was moved in divers and sundry places to declare himself for the Ben-Levi ticket, so he wrote and published a letter in which he says: "Being an anti-Romanist, I am a Republican." A mighty effort was made to suppress this after its publication, but without success, and now an ardent Republican paper which was smearing Harrison all over to attract the Irish vote, gets mad at Bishop Vincent, and says: "Having a mouth to shoot off, he shot it off, not caring who was killed by his wind bullet."
