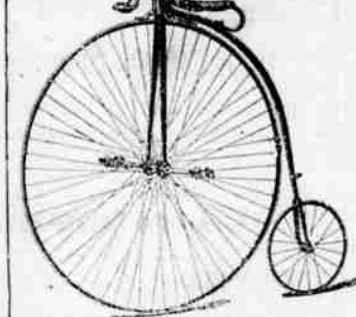

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Beat the World's Record.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—At a trial on the Manhattan Athletic Club grounds to-day, W. N. M. Barry, of the Cook athletic club, threw a sixteen-pound hammer 129 feet 3 3/4 inches, beating the world's (his own) record.

A Go-as-You-Please Race.

TROY, Aug. 12.—The seven-five-hour go-as-you-please race closed last night with the following score: Hart, 292 miles; Wright, 289; Elson, 284; Campana, 281; Burns, 203.

A Great Tragedy.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—A Times special from Omaha tells of a sanguinary conflict late last night at Shenandoah, Iowa, in which three men were killed and several wounded, one of whom will die. The report says: Frank Gallop, a member of a rather tough family, began beating his aged father. A number of citizens interfered, when young Gallop fired into the crowd, killing F. K. Pine. The unexpected shot and the dire consequences following it threw the citizens into confusion, but they soon rallied and made an advance to the house into which young Gallop had retreated. The young desperado soon appeared with two revolvers and opened a fusillade with deadly effect. The first man to fall was David Campbell, who was shot through the neck and fatally wounded. The next victim was Bird O. Rice, shot through the heart and dying instantly. T. H. Winfrey was the last man to meet him, a bullet through his leg. In the meantime, old man Gallop was shot through the shoulder, but it is not known by whom. Young Gallop returned to the house and began making preparations for escape, when Mornly Fletcher fired a shot from a rifle which, it was ascertained went through the desperado's two arms and body, killing him instantly.

Trouble in Paris.

PARIS, Aug. 12.—While Gen. Boulanger was driving in an open carriage at Saint Jean d'Angely to-day, Prof. Perrin, of the Lycee, fired five shots at him from a revolver. M. Rattapan, a friend of the general's, rushed forward and managed to turn the weapon. The result was that Rattapan himself received a bullet in the back of the head, but the wound is not serious. Two peasants were also wounded. The general was not touched. Prof. Perrin is a friend of Mayor Lair, the candidate supported by the opportunists in opposition to Boulanger. The affair occurred at the height of a pitched battle between the rival parties, when the gendarmes charged. Count Dillon received blows on the head from a stick. The Boulangerists were roughly handled. It is not certain that Perrin intended to aim at Boulanger.

Wants to Annex.

MADRID, Aug. 12.—The Cuban government reports that agitation is being carried on in Cuba, with the assistance of influential American politicians, in favor of annexation of Cuba to the United States. The Cuban situation is becoming extremely difficult, owing to financial trouble and increasing agitation in favor of home rule.

A Peculiar Reason.

SPOKANE FALLS, W. T., Aug. 12.—William Odell, partner of the young man Nelson, who fatally shot himself two weeks ago, committed suicide this morning by hanging himself with a pocket handkerchief from a branch of a tree at Hangman's creek. The body was cut down and brought to this city. Odell, who was a railroad laborer, became dependent after the death of his pal and left a note to say that he had crossed the dark river to join the spirit of his departed comrade. Deceased hails from Minnesota, where he leaves a wife and several children.
