Wheat is advancing in price by reason of large foreign buying. The outlook for wheat is unfavorable throughout western Europe.

We hope our friends will stop shouting for Blaine long enough to inquire if he is the same man that the people rejected in 1884. We suspect that he is. The name sounds familiar.

H. H. Boudinot, United States commissioner and former chairman of the republican central committee of Vigo county, Ind., has run out an endorsement for Cleveland and Thurman from his office window in Terre Haute.

A dispatch from Nashville, Tenn., says that a democratic club of 120 has been organized at Newcomb, Tenn., composed mostly of miners, who prefer cheap clothing to free whisky. The county in which Newcomb is situated only cast 20 democratic votes at the last presidential election. Now the club of 120 miners subscribes \$143.20 to meet the expenses of raising a Cleveland and Thurman flag and having a democratic barbecue.

A democratic rally was held at Golconda, Ill., the other day, at which the principle speaker was Maj. A. D. Pierce, a life-long republican. He stated that while General Harrison might be a good man, he stood upon a rotten platform. He believed in the Mills bill, and even in a greater reduction in the tariff than is proposed by the measure. He opposed free whisky, but wanted a reduction on the necessities of life.

Why shouldn't the colored people of this country hold a Cleveland convention? It is as plain as daylight that Cleveland typifies cheap food and cheap clothes, and it is as plain as the "U. S." brand on the rump of an army mule that High-Tax Harrison represents a policy that would keep every poor black cotton picker's nose to the grindstone of the millionaires.

The Herald publishes a long article about Cleveland's going to withdraw as a candidate from the presidency. It calls the story a "champion canard." Now a "canard," as defined by Webster, is "an extravagant, ridiculous fabrication," and "champion" means "greatest," and "fabrication" means "lie." Therefore the Herald calls the story the greatest, the most extravagant, the most ridiculous lie. Well the statement that Cleveland is about to withdraw is just about that kind of a fabrication.

It is not creditable to Senator Dolph to say in the United States Senate that "Harrison's record in Congress would not show that he had ever been in favor of the admission of Chinese labor to the United States." Nor is it creditable to Senator Mitchell to say that the only restrictive legislation on that subject had come from the republican party. Neither of these statements is true, as has been shown time and again by the publishing of Harrison's record. Harrison's record in the Senate was uniformly and persistently against all restrictive legislation on the subject of Chinese immigration, as any one may easily know by consulting the Congressional Record.

The Mills bill, as it passed the House, makes a reduction of \$30,832,791.23 on dutiable goods, and adds to the free list goods which now yield a revenue of \$19,758,845.51, or a total tariff reduction of \$50,591,636.74. The import duties on tobacco, liquors and silk goods are unchanged. Under the existing tariff the average rate of duty on dutiable goods is 47.10 per cent; on the same importations the average rate under the Mills bill will be 42.49. Considering the condition of the treasury, this is a very mild reduction. There is in the treasury, available for the reduction of the debt, \$103,220,464.71, and no bonds can be called until 1891, and then only \$222,000,000. After that nothing is due until 1907.

We find republicans who insist that Harrison will be elected by more than a solid North vote. They will not have it any other way. We find democrats who insist that it will be impossible to defeat Cleveland, that he will have more electoral votes than he had four years ago. They will not have it any other way. So it goes. Often these are men who read and study politics the least. Those who study the subject the most carefully seem the least disposed to predict the result. The lines of the fight are drawn differently than at any other time between the two parties. Men are deserting from both sides on account of the tariff question, and how this will affect the general result cannot now be intelligently predicted. Further developments of the tendency of public opinion must be awaited.

Blaine in his speech at Portland, Maine, on the 15th inst., speaking of trusts said: "I shall not venture to say that they are altogether advantageous but they are largely private affairs, with which President Cleveland nor any private citizen has a particular right to interfere." As to trusts Mr. Blaine thinks "they are not altogether advantageous," which means that he thinks they are largely advantageous. No other construction could be put upon his words. He says trusts "are largely private affairs with which President Cleveland nor any private person has a particular right to interfere." Here is the demagogue in full force. No one says or has said that President Cleveland or any private person has a right to interfere, but the President called on the law making power of the country for such legislation as would protect the people against them.

Let every man who has a hat or a suit of clothes bet on the election remember that the passage of the Mills bill will make them cheaper and vote accordingly.
