ELECTION BETS.—It was a hot day atmospherically and politically in August, 1884. A well known democrat, of this city, was seen on the street with a shot sack full of twenties. He had come on to the street expressly to make a bet with that republican that talked so much and bet so little. The democrat soon met his republican friend and said to him: "Now you have been talking very loud about betting for some time. You must put up or shut up." The republican made a very loud pretence of betting any amount, but on seeing that menacing shot sack he finally backed down and refused to bet any amount. The democrat, in order to keep up the pretence of being "lousy" with twenties to bet, said to a business man standing by: "Can I put this sack in your safe to-night?" The business man put it in the safe. After returning to his place of business from supper the business man reflected that that big shot sack full of twenties, was still in his safe, and he began to think it was not safe to leave it alone, as burglars might make a raid on it. So he staid in his place of business all night to protect the sack. When the owner called for the sack the business man told him he had staid up with the sack all night. "Why, you blank fool, that's not money in that sack, it's full of washers. I did that to bluff the bluffer." And then you should have heard that business man profane it.

THE WHEREFORE.—Wheat is quoted at 85 cents in San Francisco. Freight, sacks, insurance, etc., are 25 cents. This would make the legitimate price here 62 cents. 64 is being paid. At Corvallis 72 is offered. Why so much? Because they want to induce farmers to store there, and because there is a local strife. Last year, we are told, they paid at times two cents less than in Albany. It pays in the long run to follow the market that has a reliable bottom to it. If you do store in Corvallis, which is all right any way if you live nearer that place, we advise you to sell at once at that figure. Corvallis is no doubt generally as good a market as Albany, but it is a great injustice for dealers to offer a forced price and then drop to the market price. This practice does the farmer more harm than good in the long run. The DEMOCRAT wants to see the farmer get the highest possible price; but is not in favor of any traps in the business.

ARRIVED.—A few days ago there arrived three or four families in this city all the way from Rhode Island, coming here to make permanent homes. They are relatives of Mr. Olney Fry and are highly pleased with the country. One of the gentlemen, though always a Republican, says he will vote for Cleveland because his administration has been honest, clean and business like and his tariff views in accord with the best interests of the masses of the people. He says the Providence Journal, the great leading Republican paper of Rhode Island is very earnest in its support of Cleveland. He says scores of Republicans East are leaving the party on account of the whiskey plank in the Republican platform.

WANT TO COME.—Mr. Jay Blain, Secretary of the Board of Trade has shown us a letter from a Paper Mill Company in California in which they state they design to move their mill and asking what inducements the people of Albany offer. The output of paper of their mill is 67 tons per day. It would be a good thing to have in Albany.

MECHANICS' FAIR.—The DEMOCRAT is in receipt of the usual complimentary ticket of admission to the Portland Mechanics Fair which opens in that city on the 4th and closes the 27th of October. It has always been an opportunity of both pleasure and profit to visit this fair, and the attendance no doubt will be much larger this season than usual.

DISMISSED.—The case of the State against J. A. Gross, of the Depot Hotel, for assault and battery, as stated in Saturday's DEMOCRAT, was called before Justice Brink this morning. The prosecuting witness, Arthur Knoeller, failing to appear, it was dismissed. Young Knoeller had left the city.

A VACATION TRIP.—At 10:45 o'clock to-day one of the DEMOCRAT men returned from his summer vacation, which began at 5 o'clock Saturday evening. At that time, in company with Mr. F. M. French, he went to the popular summer resort of Sodaville, where his better three-quarters were already awaiting him. It was between 7 and 8 o'clock when that veritable mountain resort was reached. The cool breezes leaping down between the many outcrops made a characteristically cheerful greeting of welcome to us. A day and two nights were sufficient to make us acquainted with the situation of affairs. Mr. H. G. Klum runs the only hotel at Sodaville, which is entirely inadequate to the demands of the public; but Mr. Klum keeps a nice house for such a resort, sets good palatable tables and everything is neat and clean. He is a genial, safe man to stop with, and has two or three jewels of cooks and waiting girls around, one of whom is the lively daughter of Mr. A. B. Morris. The time at Sodaville, one of the oldest resorts in Oregon, by the way, is principally spent in trips to and from the soda springs, and sitting around in the shade and talking. It takes half the time to get acquainted there that it does at Newport or Ilwaco. Saturday night an impromptu dance was given, music by a left handed fiddler. It was principally a one set affair. Sabbath was spent quietly and peaceably, very few visitors appearing during the day. Rev. Mell, of the Evangelical church, preached in the afternoon. They tell us that as quiet as things appear many a nice little episode occurs to make life agreeable; such as buying up a lot of chickens before hand and making pretended raids on the neighbors' coops at night, to get them, engaged in at the expense of even innocent young lady boarders. Among the curiosities around Sodaville is Mr. Richter's drove of rabbits, which we were specially favored in being allowed to see, as it was reported to us that they were not open to everybody who called. He has about fifty, white, black, maltese and gray, sprightly yet tame fellows, to see whose antics is a small sized circus. Four or five tenters are on the hill and probably about twenty boarders. Among those stopping there for a day or two, a week or a month, were Mrs. Cecil, of Umatilla county; Miss Henderson, a lively young lady from Portland; Lawyer Beach and wife, of Portland; William Cole and sister, of Turner; J. K. Weatherford and wife, of Albany; Misses Burnett and Jacobs, two of Corvallis' fair daughters; Hon. William Cyrus, of Scio, who was the guest of Mr. Willis Gaines; Mr. Guthrie, a handsome railroad man from Portland; Mrs. F. M. French and children, Mrs. Ross and children and Mrs. Nutting and daughter, of Albany. Dr. Odell, formerly of Chicago, is located there and is doing a lucrative practice. Mayor Fisher is running a grocery store, and Recorder Healy sees that justice hangs properly in the balance. People are going and coming continually from Sodaville, and it will pay any one to go there for a few days, particularly those wanting rest.

THE O. P.—The Oregon Pacific is pushing ahead just as fast as its contractors can secure men to do the work. As much will be done this fall as has been claimed, and next spring more active operations may be looked for. A Salem paper says: "Mr. E. M. Waite called at this office to tell the result of his observations on the railroad. The O. P. is busy laying rails, having already passed Stanton. The engineers expect to pass Don Smith's this fall if some considerable bridges and blasting do not hinder. Mr. Waite and others went up the track five miles beyond Smith's and toward the narrows, and found that the winter rains had hardly washed out any thing worth speaking of. There is a camp of engineers there, and as much of the grading is comparatively easy, rapid progress will be made when that neighborhood is reached."
