LOCAL RECORD.

Mr. Hood.—Messrs. Crawford and Littler the photographers arrived home last night from an eventful trip up Mt. Hood, the pride of the Northwest. Both were elated with their experiences, Mr. Littler, who came from sunny Florida particularly so. They ascended the mountain 11,500 feet, and took ninety-nine views while gone, some of which will be very fine. Among other trophies of their trip they brought back the jaw-bone of some strange beast, found at the snow line, and some sulphur from the crater. They could have gone to the top, but were ready to return home and so gave it up. Mr. Henry Conner, of Portland arrived in Albany on the same train on a visit. He is also just back from a trip to Mt. Hood, which with five other young men of Portland he ascended to the very apex. It was some sulphur which he plucked from the crater that Mr. Crawford displayed to a DEMOCRAT man. The atmosphere on the mountain is fine, and the trip is one it will pay any one to make.

A DREAM.—Last night an Albany man went home from the Board of Trade and dreamed, for a fact, that he figured the matter out and found that the amount that would be expended on the circus would just bring the proposed paper mill to this city, that a paper was circulated and generally signed, according to which the subscribers agreed to give their money to the project instead of going to the circus. A committee of seven was appointed, and when the circus came were stationed around the field and labored with the farmers, who will be most benefited by a mill, and when the hour arrived it was discovered that only seven were on the benches. The revelation awakened the dreamer. In the meantime the circus will be here next Monday and of course everybody will go. Once a year is not very often for a circus. When the proper time comes no doubt our farmer friends will also "come down" handsomely to the extent of several tons of straw for a paper mill.

SKIRMISHING.—Last night the war correspondent of the DEMOCRAT might have been seen hovering around Monteith's pasture in order to obtain a view of a skirmishing drill by "F" Company of this city. At about 8:30 the Company rallied by force and began its maneuvers towards the Mount Shasta branch of the Southern Pacific railroad. THE FOSTER CASE.—The case of Neal against Foster, which has been decided in favor of the plaintiff, so far as the Foster block is concerned, the transfer of that building being declared fraudulent, we are told will be appealed. Neal is a Californian, to whom the transfer of two judgments was made by Portland houses for the purpose of getting the case in the U. S. courts. Under the decision Mr. W. H. Goltra will get nothing on his judgments as they had been settled in the circuit court. So after all, should the appeal be sustained, the farmers, of the county, who were the most needy losers, will not get a cent.
