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POLITICAL HISTORY FOR WORKINGMEN.

Workingmen. Republican organs and speakers say that tariff reform is "free trade," and this because the Mills bill contemplates putting certain raw materials upon the free list. This cry of free trade is made for political effect, for the republican platforms of the past and the leading men of the party have urged tariff revision and reform, and many of them have voted to enlarge the free list. Were republicans "free traders" then, and willing "to strike down our industries?" Let us see.

Workingmen. Candidate Harrison said, while United States Senator in November, 1882: "The creation of the tariff commission was a confession that the tariff needs revision. If the report comes in it should be promptly acted upon. My opinion is that no time should be lost after Congress assembles in bringing forward these measures." Was he an enemy to American industries and a free trader?

Workingmen. Candidate Levi P. Morton, when a member of Congress in April, 1880, voted to pass the bill to place salt and other articles on the free list. If putting salt and raw materials on the free list now is free trade, was Mr. Morton a free trader then?

Workingmen. The republican platform of 1868 declared: "It is due to the labor of the nation that taxation should be equalized and reduced as rapidly as the national faith will permit." And in 1884 it said: "The republican party pledges itself to correct the inequalities of the tariff and to reduce the surplus." Were these free trade declarations?

Workingmen. Hon. William D. Kelley, of Pennsylvania, the great republican high tariff leader, said on the 22d of April, 1872, on the necessity of reducing taxation: "If we adjourn on the 29th of May we shall have repealed no tax or duty, and the people will ask us in every paper and at every corner why we have continued the system of taxation, so largely in excess of the demands of the government and the reduction of the public debt, at the rate of \$50,000,000 per annum outside of what is already provided by law. On neither side of the house can justification be found, nor do I believe apologies which will prove entirely satisfactory to the tax payers, who are loaded at every point and whose profits are absorbed in the excessive treasury of the government." And again, in July, 1886, we find him on record as follows: "Let the raw material come in. Let us make blankets that will drive out English friezes. Let us make our own 'English frieze' and 'Peterborough frosted beaver.' Let us be able to rival England and France and other representative nations in making these cloths." Will anybody claim that Mr. Kelley is or was a free trader?

Workingmen. Hon. John D. Long of Massachusetts said in September, 1884: "There are only two ways to reduce the tariff. One by raising the tariff to a prohibitory height, which nobody advocates; the other, the free list is the honest revenue reformer's hope." This is good democratic doctrine, but will anybody claim ex Governor Long was or is a free trader?

Workingmen. Presidents Garfield, Grant and Arthur, Vice President Henry Wilson, republican secretaries of the treasury and other leading men are found recorded as holding the same views as above. You were not told that they wanted to ruin the country because they believed in reducing taxation, neither should you believe that the same doctrines would do it now when the cry of free trade is raised for political effect.

Mr. Blaine is said to have got his thirty-two trunks through the New York Custom House without an examination. Blaine is not a staunch protectionist when it is a personal condition that confronts him, and no a general theory.

Trusts can scarcely be considered "private affairs" when one of them is now grinding an extortionate profit on bagging out of millions of cotton raisers in the South. Mr. Blaine cannot hold the colored vote by such doctrine as that.

It may be all right for Republican tariff howlers to employ imported pauper labor because it comes cheaper; but it is evidence that high tariff taxes afford no protection to labor, while they increase the cost of living to the laborer.

There is a boom in wool at Boston, with immense sales and higher prices. The Mills bill does not seem to have scared manufacturers very much, even though it puts wool on the free list.

Candidate Morton's imported Italians are said to believe that protection is a panacea for all European ills.

I recommend immediate legislative action conferring upon the Executive the power to suspend by proclamation the operation of all laws and regulations permitting the transit of goods, wares and merchandise in bond across or over the territory of the United States to or from Canada. —President's message.
