NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

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The republicans in the United States Senate are plotting treason against their own platform which they find both unpleasant and embarrassing, as well as a great stumbling block in their campaign for the presidency. They will not make a fair, open, manly fight and win distinction even in defeat, but they will attempt to shift their ground, but they will be held strictly to the platform and policy of highly taxed clothing and food and cheap whisky.

The bill of Representative Wilson of Minnesota provides two modes of retaliation for Canadian outrages against American fisheries and commerce. The first is to suspend the transportation of goods in bond across the United States territory to or from Canada, while by the second the Executive would be empowered to cause to be levied and collected a toll of 20 cents a ton upon every foreign vessel and cargo passing through Sault Ste. Marie or St. Clair Canal whenever any discrimination was made against American vessels or property in the collection or retention tolls on Canadian canals or rivers.

From the pencil of Th. Nast comes a very suggestive cartoon representing two "protected" American manufacturers dining in one of the most aristocratic hotels in London. The dining room is fitted up in the most gorgeous and costly style, and waiters dressed in costly livery stand at all points waiting the beck and nod of the two "protected" gentlemen, who are on their annual trip to Europe. The cartoon is named "American Infant Monopolists Abroad." One of the diners says to the other: "We are intensely American, you know, but if our infant industries are not protected to the fullest extent, we can't live in England, you know. Just think how degrading it would be to be obliged to go home and earn a living." Mr. Nast's cartoons are all for Cleveland and tariff reform.

It must, indeed, be very humiliating to the candid, conscientious members of a great political party, which, less than four years ago pledged itself in its national platform to correct the inequalities of the tariff and to reduce the surplus by its revision, to now find their party advocating the very opposite policy—that is a continuation of the war taxes on the necessities of life, and a repeal, (if necessary to reduce the surplus,) of the entire internal revenue taxes, namely, the tax on whisky, tobacco and oleomargarine, and by this betrayal of the interests of labor and agriculture bring their party to an attitude of bad faith before the country. But truth is mighty and will prevail over falsehood, misrepresentation, treachery and deception. The laboring people will take care of their own interests at the polls, the republican leaders to the contrary notwithstanding.

The policy of the protectionists is to enable a few favored monopolies so to advance the prices of their productions, by taxes taken directly from the pockets of the American masses, that foreign products of the same sort cannot compete with them in our market, and that in consequence labor in foreign countries is cheapened and driven out of employment in a great measure. This foreign cheap labor then drifts to the United States, where it is employed at once by the protected monopolies, and thus "cuts under" native American labor, and accordingly the monopolies profit in both directions while the home labor market is assaulted simultaneously in front and in rear. This heartless and unpatriotic dealing with the bone and sinew of our own nation should be stopped forthwith. The entire reformation of our iniquitous and inequitable tariff system is the crying and pressing need of the hour.

The Hartford *Courant* never lost any love on Mr. Blaine. It supported him in 1884, but it bore his defeat with a resignation that was beautiful to behold. The Maine statesman's defense of the trusts affords it an opportunity, which we fancy it enjoys extremely, of mild mutiny against his assumption of command. But it won't do. The colored man who never had any father or mother or brother or sister and who said, "When you just see Sam you see all there is of us," resembled the Grand Old Party of to-day. When you see Mr. Blaine you see about all there is of the Republican party.

A dispatch to the Philadelphia *Times* says that John A. Boyer, a New York flour and grain dealer, who is visiting his mother-in-law, Mrs. D. G. Yuengling, at Penn., has announced that, although he had always been a Republican, he has been so much impressed with President Cleveland's administration and present attitude that he would vote for him next fall.

Scarcely have the Republican leaders in the Senate arranged a program to counteract the deep disgust among the Republican masses toward the free whisky high tariff platform than Blaine comes to make confession worse confounded with his deliberately studied apology for the Trusts. Friends, foes of the "greatest living statesman" are amazed at this speech. The party managers, astounded at its audacity vainly ask each other: What does it mean? Whatever may have been the motives of its author, they reflect, he could not have struck a more deadly blow at the Republican candidates and the cause.
