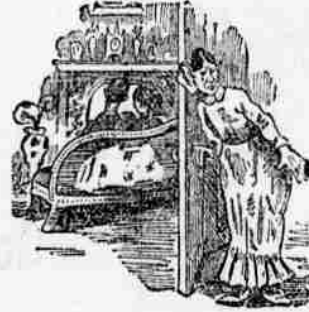

Mr. Depew, of New York, who was a prominent candidate before the National republican convention for the presidency, and who, like Gresham, when beaten, hid himself off to Europe, has just returned and treats the republican campaign army with this broadside:

"I met an Englishman, and he was a nobleman of high education, who had traveled all around the world, and much in America, who was in favor of Harrison's election. I was somewhat surprised, for Harrison is hardly known over there, even by name, and I asked him why. He said it was because a tariff reduction such as was proposed by the democrats would be a bad thing for the English manufacturers, for it would then enable the Americans to compete with them in the markets of the world, while under the present system the Englishmen have everything their own way. His opinion was that with free raw material American manufacturers would become formidable competitors, to the detriment of English manufacturers."

This is a beautiful story, but no more beautiful than truthful, and has the effect of knocking an enormous amount of wind out of republican campaign sails.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Fool and His money.
NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—A fine-looking well-dressed man was arrested last night by the police, and locked up on a charge of intoxication. He had over \$600 in his pockets. When he recovered he described himself as A. V. Hyde, a clothing merchant of Salt Lake City, and said he belonged to a Mormon family of that place, and was stopping with his wife at a hotel in this city. He had been here a week and had been drinking heavily, and the money found in his possession was all that was left of \$18,000 that he had brought with him. In court this morning he was discharged.

The U. P. Election.
NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Northern Pacific was held in this city to-day. The only change in the board as chosen is the election of J. C. Bullitt in the place of August Belmont. The report presented showed the gross earnings of the year ending June 30th to be \$15,846,327; increase over the preceding year, \$3,056,870; operating expenses, \$9,266,884; increase, \$2,093,865; net earnings, \$6,579,443; increase, \$963,015.
 Thos. F. Oakes was elected president. The refusal of the Union Pacific directors to carry out the joint lease of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company is noted.

Judge Terry and Wife Indicted.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20.—About 3 o'clock this afternoon the United States grand jury reported to the district court four indictments against ex-Judge David S. Terry, and two against Mrs. Sarah Althea Terry. The indictments are based upon the recent out break in the circuit court room during the reading of the decision in the Sharon case by Justice Field, and the parties are charged with threatening and assaulting the marshal and his deputies.

A Gigantic Wheat Steal.
MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 20.—W. G. Hanley, a commission dealer, of the firm of Peterson & Hanley, was arrested about midnight on a warrant charging him with stealing 150,000 bushels of wheat from the Minneapolis union elevator No. 2. It was first discovered that 50,000 bushels of wheat had been stolen by overloading cars. Hanley has been D. C. Moak & Co's cashier and bookkeeper. They are grain dealers, and have suspended, a large amount of their paper having gone to protest yesterday. Others are suspected of complicity, including well known wheat men, and it was said the announcement of the names would cause a profound sensation. By the advice of his attorney, Hanley refused to talk.

Y. M. C. A.
SEATTLE, W. T., Sept. 20.—The first session of the annual convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of the Pacific Northwest was held here to-day. Delegates were present from all parts of Oregon, British Columbia and Washington territory. The delegates were welcomed by R. B. Albertson, on behalf of the city. A response was made by Wm. Wadhams, a prominent wholesale merchant of Portland, Oregon. A speech was also made by Rev. R. B. Swift and Theo. H. Harding of Washington, D. C., representative of the national committee of the Y. M. C. A. The president of the local association also gave a speech of welcome. A mass meeting was largely attended to-night in the opera house. The principal address was by Dr. John Reed of Victoria, B. C.

In Miss. Nov.
JACKSON, Miss., Sept. 20.—Three unmistakable cases of yellow fever developed here to-day. The panic of 1877 was not comparable to that now prevailing among the citizens. The news of suspicious cases of fever did not get out until 3 o'clock this afternoon, but before 8 o'clock hundreds had left town by rail and other roads, and many more are preparing to leave. The two banks in town paid out over \$20,000 each after banking hours this afternoon, to their depositors who are leaving.

Very Peculiar Death.
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 20.—While trying to avoid being kissed a woman, George Vindie of Baltimore, fell down stairs and was killed. This is probably the first instance of the kind on record. A man sometimes is willing to give his life for a kiss, but never to avoid one.
