JUTE SACKS AGAIN.

The *Herald*, like a drowning man clutches at a straw—jute, manila, ramie and other textile grasses, and all because these "straws" are put on the free list by the republican tariff bill submitted the other day. The editor of that paper chuckles gleefully because from a species of instinct, he concludes that this is a complete answer to the position of the DEMOCRAT on the jute sack question. But there is not a single crumb of comfort in the whole matter for him. See how all this cause of chuckling vanishes when subjected to analysis. The DEMOCRAT insists that jute sacks, and not jute alone, should be put on the free list. The Mills bill puts jute sacks on the free list. This is in the interest of the farmer. The republican bill puts a 40 per cent duty on jute sacks. This is in the interest of one or two jute manufacturers at the expense of the farmer. The *Herald* rejoices that the republican bill stands by the manufacturer at the expense of the farmer. The DEMOCRAT as ever raises its protests against taxing the farmers exclusively and alone for the benefit of a few jute manufacturers. See the unfairness of this republican bill. Under the present law there is a duty of 20 per cent. on jute and this bill removes that duty wholly in the interest of the manufacturer. Under the present law there is a duty of 40 per cent on jute sacks and this duty the bill retains in the interest of the manufacturer. And this kind of robbery on the farmers of the country the *Herald* heartily endorses. But the esteemed *Herald* still wanders in Egyptian darkness. It heartily endorses the republican committee for putting jute, manila, ramie and other textile grasses on the free list, but the Mills bill had done this thing long ago, so that you now approve what the democrats did long ago. The *Herald* is in a hole—about the safest place for it to be. But there is another feature of this subject that we must not overlook—the fact that the *Herald* editor has become a free trader. Yes sir, an actual, open blatant free trader. He endorses the republican senate in his heart of hearts. That bill puts acorns on the free list, therefore the *Herald* man is a free trader. Is it possible that he will thus ruin the acorn industry in this country? As another evidence of his being a free trader we cite the fact that this bill puts human hair, raw, on the free list. Here is an assault on the human hair industry. Shades of Blaine, what fatality now hangs over our beloved country. Then again this bill puts sand on the free list, and the result will be that the sand industry will be ruined. And last we now mention that bristles, hogs' bristles, are actually put on the free list, and we might go *ad libitum*, but enough has been said to show that the whole bill is a free trade measure backed up by British gold and British influence.

Henry A. Robinson, an old republican of Detroit Michigan, and who was the republican candidate for congress two years ago, has renounced his party and has declared for Cleveland. Hear him:

"For many years I have been aware of the wicked and grievous burdens imposed upon the laboring masses by the protective (?) tariff system, and have hoped that the good work of its reform might be begun under the 'revision' promises that have been so freely indulged in by the Republican party. But such hopes have been in vain. The promises of that party to relieve the people from unjust taxation—after it had completed the cheerful service of relieving the rich and powerful from just taxation—have been steadily violated, and the culmination of Republican insincerity, not to say hypocrisy, is found in the Chicago platform of this year, which unqualifiedly commits the party to protection as a principle to be perpetuated in American politics, and that commitment has been re-echoed and emphasized in Mr. Harrison's letter of acceptance, where he says that 'the protective system is constitutional, wholesome and necessary.' If I owed allegiance to any party, as such, these declarations would afford sufficient reasons to absolve me, for I believe and approve the statement of Allen G. Thurman, that the tariff is a tax, and the utterances of President Cleveland that all unnecessary taxation is unjust taxation. The wages question, so far as involved, in that of the tariff, is to me a matter of paramount importance in this presidential contest, and as I do not believe, as is claimed by the advocates of protection, that a protective tariff, which is but another name for a shackle upon commerce, makes high wages, and as I do believe the precise opposite of the claim, to wit, that freedom, not restriction or slavery in any form, is the parent of all, I therefore support Cleveland.

A protectionist organ cites the increase of wages for carpenters and masons during the last thirty years as one of the results of the tariff. What, is the protective duty on carpenters and masons coming from other countries to compete with American mechanics on their own ground?

For comparison with the European products in the matter of cost of labor Mr. Schoenhof took for a standard ladies' button boots of first quality, manufactured at Lynn Mass. His samples were universally praised in Europe for their workmanship and appearance. From the information given to Mr. Schoenhof it appears that the cost of the labor in turning out a pair of such goods in Lynn is 35 cents. For the labor employed in making shoes of the same description there is paid in Frankfort 61 cents; in Berlin 57 cents, in Vienna 71 cents, in Stafford 63½ cents and in Leicester 64 cents. Taking the American cost again as a basis, the labor cost in Frankfort is 74 per cent greater than in Lynn, in Berlin 88 per cent greater, Vienna 103 per cent greater, in Stafford 82 per cent greater and in Leicester 83 per cent greater. But on account of their superior skill, greater adaptability, more complete machinery and more active vital force, due the better subsistence, &c., the weekly earnings of men and women in the American shops are very much greater than abroad.
