A FALSIFIER.

For some days the *Oregonian* has had standing in its columns an extract purporting to be a resolution of the democratic platform of this state of 1886. To show how destitute that paper is of fair dealing or honesty, we call the attention of republicans who swear by it to the moral forgery it is guilty of in garbling the resolution. The last clause in the resolution of the platform reads as follows: "And we condemn a republican congress in reducing the tariff on wool and in increasing the tariff on woolen goods. The *Oregonian* publishes the last clause as follows: "And we condemn a republican congress in reducing the tariff on wool"—and stops short as though that was all of the resolution. This kind of journalism is disreputable and we must be permitted to express our surprise that even the *Oregonian* would so degrade itself as to garble the language of another so as to destroy the real meaning. This it does to retaliate on the democratic press of the state for publishing copious and numerous extracts from that paper showing that until recently it has, for many years, been an out and out tariff-for-revenue-only paper. By the above garbled extract from the democratic platform of 1886 it attempts to show that the democrats are inconsistent in having been opposed to reduction of the tariff on wool then and in favor of it now. It will be remembered that democrats opposed the republican tariff bill of 1883 on the ground that it raised the duty on woolen goods while it reduced it on wool. Democrats favored reducing on both. This falsifying the record by the *Oregonian* is in line with the general course of that paper marked out for itself during this campaign. One man at least has learned to his sorrow that it is not safe to bet on any statement made by that paper.

At the beginning of the present campaign the charge was frequently made by working men in Indiana that Mr. Harrison during the railroad strikes in that and other states in 1877 said that, "a dollar a day was enough for a laboring man." This has been vehemently denied by Harrison's friends. John C. New, Harrison's right hand man, offered \$2000 to any one who would furnish proof of the charge. Assembly No. 106, of Knights of Labor, took the matter up and furnished over a dozen affidavits in proof of the charge, one of which we publish below:

"State of Indiana, Marion county, ss.:
John G. Schwartz, being duly sworn, testifies under oath that he was employed by the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati & Indianapolis Railway in July, 1877; that he went on a strike on the day that the strike took place, on or about July 19, 1877, for an increase in wages; that he was present at the conference meeting in the old Council Chamber, held during the period that said strike lasted, where Benjamin Harrison, Albert G. Porter and other prominent citizens spoke with reference to the strike; that he heard Benjamin Harrison say that they (the strikers) were law-breakers, and as such were not entitled to any sympathy whatever from the public; that the said Benjamin Harrison (now a presidential candidate) further said that the men ought to return to their work, that the railroads could not afford to pay high wages, that the wages were enough, and that \$1 per day was enough for any workingman, that he himself could live on that amount, and that Benjamin Harrison further said that if the men did not return to work the militia should be brought into service and the men forced to return to work.

It would be absolutely impossible to conceive of a more sectional partisan tariff bill than that presented by the republicans in the senate. The republican bill puts a 40 per cent duty on sacks which means that the farmers shall pay an annual tax of \$20,000 to \$25,000. Choose ye on November 6th whom you will have to serve you. Vote in your own interest. Don't be a clam any longer.

The democratic National committee has issued an address to democrats and tariff reformers of the country asking such contributions in money as each may feel disposed to give to assist in paying the legitimate expenses of the campaign. The expenses of the committee are very large this year owing to the fact that millions of campaign documents must be printed and distributed throughout the country, besides the extraordinary expenses for speakers and other necessary things to be done.
