ON A HIGH HORSE.

The *Oregonian* is on a "high horse" because we convicted it of moral forgery in changing the meaning of a resolution in the democratic platform of 1886, by cutting off and leaving out a material part of it. This forgery was one of design. It is in perfect accord with a dozen others of which it has been guilty during this campaign. The *Democrat* said that in 1883 the democracy opposed the tariff bill because it reduced the duty on wool and increased it on woolen goods, and that they were in favor of reducing it on both. This the *Oregonian* with characteristic disregard of the truth denies in the face of the evidence afforded in the Congressional Record. When the tariff bill of 1883 was about to be voted on Mr. Carlisle said: "I have announced here more than once during the progress of the debate on this subject that I stood ready to vote for an average reduction of even 20 per cent. justly and equitably distributed among all the articles subject to taxation under our custom laws. The same declaration has been made substantially, at least, by several other gentlemen on this side; but it has so far failed to receive a favorable response from those who control the legislation of the house." Again Mr. Carlisle, who opposed the bill, said: "Then, again, this report proposes to increase the duties upon large classes of cotton goods, and upon a very large class of woolen goods." Again he said: "Then, on a large class of woolen goods another very material increase of duty is proposed." The above extracts conclusively show that the *Democrat* was right, and that the *Oregonian* is the one guilty of lying about the matter. This species of falsification of facts and mutilation of statement is by no means the only one of which that paper is guilty.

In its issue of Aug. 7, it said editorially: "Thurman, of bandana fame, said in 1879, in the United States senate, 'Free immigration would be advantageous as furnishing a class of cheap and efficient laborers.' It could not have been otherwise than that the *Oregonian* knew this was false as this was a badly mutilated extract from a speech that Thurman did make at that time, and the *Oregonian* had the means of verifying it had it desired to do so. Now read what Thurman did say and the animus of the *Oregonian* will appear at once: 'Their (Chinese) presence in our country, although it might be advantageous as furnishing a set of cheap and efficient laborers, carries with it such disadvantages that they more than counterbalance all the benefits we could derive from their presence.' On the strength of the statement made by the *Oregonian* about Thurman's speech, Mr. Alexander, a gentleman in Tacoma, a republican, made a bet that Thurman had used such language and wrote to the *Oregonian* to furnish the proof of the statement. But the editor of that paper knowing full well that the proof could not be furnished, remained silent. Mr. Alexander not receiving any answer wrote to the *Oregonian* again, and again the *Oregonian* refused to answer, whereupon Mr. Alexander grew impatient and published all the facts saying:

"This leads me to believe that so far as my party is concerned the campaign is conducted solely on falsehood and misrepresentation. The organs of the party make statements which they must know to be lies and deceive their friends as the *Oregonian* deceived me into making a bet on its statement about Thurman and losing it. In order to prevent any one else from betting money on the editorial statements of the *Oregonian*, I hope you will publish the above in your paper."

This was a reproof richly deserved so far as the *Oregonian* is concerned. It shows that integrity of statement is as much a stranger to the editorial columns of that paper as belief in a Supreme Being is to Bob Ingersoll.

The Government has bought \$60,000,000 of unmatured bonds at a cost of \$75,000,000. This means that over \$15,000,000 (fifteen millions) has been paid in premiums to bondholders within six months. And this is the policy that Gen. Harrison would perpetuate.

It appears that William R. Foster, the Produce Exchange "ogre" of New York, is a brother to the celebrated "ogre" of the *Oregonian*. Foster at the head of the Republican League it is said that the following statement will resign as a consequence of his brother's trouble.

Some of the manufacturers of Indiana are discharging those of their employees who purpose voting for Cleveland. That is hardly the way to make the help of his grandfather popular with the workmen.

WHY?

If, as protectionists say, manufactured products are made cheaper in this country in consequence of the high tariff levied upon similar imported articles, why is it that the manufacturer favors such a law? Does he want a law that will cheapen the price of the article which he has to sell, unless the same law by some means, reduces the cost of the making of the article, such as reducing the wages he has to pay and the cost of the raw materials which he uses? If he be a sane man he would not. Does the farmer want a law that will reduce the price of wheat which he has to sell, unless the same law by some means, reduces the cost of raising the wheat that will more than compensate for his loss on the reduction in its price? Certainly not. Then how do both the manufacturer and the farmer favor the high protective tariff? Simply because it relieves the price of their products by giving them more exclusive control of the home market. And this is the reason why certain mercantile classes at every recurring election turn themselves loose and use every means in their power to elect a president and congress that will continue high protection. This is the reason why he suffers the "fat" to the extent of hundreds and even thousands of dollars "fried" out of him to carry the election in favor of war taxes.

Mr. Blaine's speech in New York Saturday evening was boldly characteristic of the uncrowned king of humbug. A more audacious misstatement and perversion of the facts of history was never ventured before an audience supposed to possess ordinary intelligence.
