An Indianapolis firm of Republicans are reported as discharging such of their employees as refuse to vote for Harrison. The name of the firm is E. C. Atkins & Co., and they manufacture saws. There is no protection for the discharged workmen.

Indiana is now afflicted by 2500 campaign orators. One hundred of these are prohibitionists and the rest are about equally divided between democrats and republicans. The Hoosiers are gradually coming to the conclusion that about the worst thing that can happen to a man is to be born in a pivotal state.

Harrison says, reduce the surplus by the purchase of bonds at the rate of \$1300 on \$100; the Chicago platform declares for a reduction of the surplus by extravagant expenditure, and without touching the tariff; the Republican senate says, reduce the surplus by reducing the revenue \$75,000,000. Which is to be the policy of the Republican party?

The ever taxed and overburdened consumers of the country will heave a sigh of relief when they read what generous provision is made for them in the Senate bill for revision of the tariff. They will still have to pay a heavy tax on lumber, iron, salt and window-glass; but human hair and curling stone handles are to come in free. It is an interesting table, that, of additions to the free list.

The Senate tariff bill places sponges on the free list. This is a remarkable step for the Republican party to take. No political organization in the world's history has devoted itself so assiduously to the manufacture of sponges as the party which believes in spending the surplus for the maintenance of sinecures. The free admission of foreign sponges to this country is not in line with the Republican party's claim that it wishes to protect from competition to manufactures it has itself begotten.

The cotton mills get their raw material free, and the woolen manufacturers pay a tax on theirs, and this is the result:

Imported. Exported.
Woolen goods.....\$44,902,718 \$ 439,342
Cotton goods.....28,940,353 14,929,342
Of Cotton goods we export one-half as much as we import; of woolen goods we import twenty times as much as we export. This tells the story in language so plain that a fool can read it.

The whole earnings of labor in the protected industries only amount to \$18 in the \$100 of product. The average tariff tax is \$47 in \$100. If foreign labor should be twice as cheap as our own labor, a tax of \$9 on the \$100 would make good the difference in labor cost. The remaining \$38 in \$100 is wrung from the earnings of workingmen, who receive no equivalent in wages or advantage. It is this \$38 of "protection for the sake of protection" that fills the pockets of the few and filches from the pockets of the many.

The Bridgeport, Connecticut, Farmer says: "Precisely why it should be assumed that the chances in this state favor Harrison does not appear clearly. To be sure, the democratic campaign is not being pushed so energetically by the party's managers as in New York and Indiana, but there is not probably another state in the Union in which so little of the usual campaign machinery needs to be run. The daily press reports show that in no population of similar number have there been so many and such conspicuous changes from republicanism to Cleveland's support or so few losses of democratic votes on account of the tariff question."

The firm of Thomas Lee & Co., of Philadelphia, has been detected smuggling English made blankets in bales of wool from Canada to the United States. It was only a few days previously that this firm issued a circular addressed to republican business men "to speak in unmistakable tones in favor of the American system of protection and against the admission of foreign made goods." If the Lees were honest when they sent out the circular they certainly were not honest when they smuggled the blankets. But, perhaps, the latter occurrence was only an eccentricity of great moral ideas.

Fifty thousand people attended the democratic meeting at Crawfordsville, Indiana, yesterday. Thurman spoke saying he was happy to see all around him the signs of coming victory.

The Democrats propose a reduction of fifty million in taxes, mainly on necessities. The Republicans propose a reduction of seventy-five millions, mainly on luxuries. Which do you like best?
