PASSION'S APPEAL.

The *Oregonian*, fearful that the false cry of "free trade" which it has so lustily used during the campaign, will not avail to save its party from defeat, has once again called into requisition that spirit of hate and animosity, which, during the campaign of 1884, took undisputed possession of its editor and caused the production of such wild, eccentric articles in that paper as to cause many of its readers to inquire whether it was possible that such stuff could possibly emanate from a sound mind. We are now to have a repetition of these wild howlings about the "solid south," and the "bloody shirt" will be used to arouse and kindle anew the bitter animosities of the days of internecine strife. It matters not that this stirring up of the passions of men crushes out all feelings of citizenship, widens the gap between those who should live in peace and harmony, disturbs the business of the country, shakes the foundation of the citadel of patriotism, and teaches men to hate and despise a portion of their political heritage. The purpose of the wild and passionate appeal which appeared in the *Oregonian* of last Saturday is patent in every line. Finding that reason and logic will not suffice to convince many to support its candidate, it hopes to secure their support by appealing to their passions and hates, and notwithstanding this wild raving about the "solid south" and the "southern confederacy" is an insult to the intelligence of every reasonable, well informed voter of the country, yet it hopes by this course to secure the support of enough of the wicked, depraved, ignorant voters of the country to bring success to its candidate. It labors with a zeal worthy of a much better cause to show that the democrats of the south will not even tolerate republicans to become candidates for office in opposition to democratic candidates. It says: "In the state of Georgia, in the election held October 4, not an opposition vote was cast; no man dared to be a candidate in opposition to the prevailing despotism." No one understands the utter fallaciousness of such a statement better than the *Oregonian*. It was made purely for political effect. It was not made in the interest of truth or the public good. Such thoughts were entirely foreign to the writer when he made it. Republicans are just as free to become candidates in Georgia as in Oregon, but that party in Georgia is made up of a class of carpetbaggers and scalawags, the stench from whose lives as politicians still infests the political atmosphere in that state to such a degree that no such candidates could hope to receive the votes of honest men, black or white, and hence the utter futility of their becoming candidates. The same condition obtains in Mississippi, Alabama and South Carolina. The *Oregonian* may make the "bloody shirt" serve its demoniac purpose in the sphere of its circulation, but happily its party as a party will never attempt to conduct another campaign with that as a paramount issue. The more this species of hate is resorted to the weaker that party is made in the estimation of all decent, fair minded republicans.
