High-tariff statesman: "Of course you are delighted with the senate substitute for the Mills bill?" Workingmen: "Well, dunno." "You don't know? Was there ever such ingratitude! Here we've laid awake nights getting up a bill to lessen your burdens and you don't seem pleased a bit." "Did you put anything on the free list?" "Yes, sir; acorns, sir. You can get them by the ton and not pay a cent of duty. Isn't it glorious? Carry the good news to your children, my good man—go to them at once. Tell them they can eat all the acorns they want."

"Whisky and tobacco," says Mr. William Green, a Republican candidate for the State Senate in Texas, in his address to the voters, "are just as necessary as flour and bacon, for where parties use tobacco they crave it, and must have it. Whiskey is needed in all families for medical purposes, and a little good whisky don't hurt any laboring man, and if it was not for this tax, you could buy a gallon of good whisky for 50 cents." Mr. Green further explains that this is the policy of the Republican party as opposed to that of the Democrats, who "want [dress goods covered by the Mills bill] to come in free of duty so they can clothe their families in good style at small expense." Mr. Green may not be a discreet politician, but he unquestionably understands the Republican platform.

The New York World sums up the difference as follows:

"The Mills bill reduces the average duty to 42.68 per cent. The republican senate bill reduces the average to 42.23 per cent. If tariff reduction means free trade, the republican measure is therefore .45 per cent. more of a free trade bill than the democratic measure."

The Mills bill revises but eleven of the fourteen schedules. The senate bill revises them all. If tariff revision is a "first step toward free trade," the republican measure therefore takes three steps more than the democratic.

The Mills bill extends the free list. So does the senate bill, and by nearly the same number of articles. If one is free trade for this reason, so is the other.

The Mills bill would cut off about \$75,000,000 of the surplus. The senate bill cuts off \$72,000,000. If there is "no surplus" how dare the republicans propose this?

Acting Secretary Thompson, of the treasury department, in speaking in regard to the probable condition of the treasury at the end of the present fiscal year, said:

"The appropriation bills having all been passed by the present congress, some estimate can now be made of the probable surplus of revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1888, over the expenditures for the same year. Estimating one or two minor items, they amount in the aggregate to \$306,000,000, with the estimated expenditures from the permanent annual appropriations, which are put at \$115,640,798, making a total of \$421,640,798."

The total estimated revenues are \$440,500,000, making an excess of revenue over the total appropriations of about \$19,000,000. But this by no means represents the actual surplus of revenue for the current fiscal year. A careful estimate shows that of these appropriations, which are specific, and continuing appropriations there will be at least \$37,000,000, which will not and cannot be properly expended during this fiscal year, which make an actual surplus of \$56,000,000, which is substantially the same amount estimated by the secretary in his annual report. But even this does not fairly represent the surplus revenues for the fiscal year 1889, for in the appropriations above stated there is included the sum of about \$18,000,000 for deficiencies in appropriations for 1888 and prior years which should have been appropriated for at a prior session of congress and paid out of the surplus revenues of former years. This added to the above sum of \$56,000,000 increases the surplus revenues of 1889 to \$74,000,000."
