The republican senators introduced a tariff reform bill and then prevailed upon congress to adjourn. The King of France with forty thousand men marched up the hill and then marched down again.

Gen. Harrison wants this election to settle things so that "the principle of protection shall not again be assailed." Is this a rebuke to the senate tariff tinkers for taking off 50 per cent. of the protection so long given to the infant industry of sugar-growing?

The people of California owe Mr. Cleveland a debt of gratitude for the manner in which he stood by them on the Chinese question. They owe Mr. Thurman a debt of gratitude for his attitude on that question ever since it was first agitated. They are going to pay their debt.

Workmen in a gravel bed on the Western Railway of Alabama recently came upon the skeleton of what they think was an Indian princess. On it were found a silver coronet, silver bracelets, a necklace made of silver buckles tied together with a silk ribbon, and a peculiar knife with a sabre blade.

The senate tariff bill smashed the republican national platform. It justified the democratic demand for a reduction of the surplus and a revision of the tariff. It buried the "free trade" bugaboo. Having thus repudiated the declared policy of their party the republican senators repudiate their own bantling by adjourning without even asking a vote on it. It is a complete fiasco.

In his speech thanking the convention which renominated him for congress, Hon. Samuel J. Randall took occasion to commend in the highest terms the administration of President Cleveland, and to warmly advocate his re-election. He also announced himself as strongly in favor of reforming the tariff, so as to do away with the surplus.

The same mill owners who four years ago said that if Mr. Cleveland should be elected they would close up their mills without delay, and who, nevertheless having prospered ever since, are now busy repeating their nonsense and apparently with as much earnestness as ever, while the orators are going about like roaring lions, scaring the life out of the mill hands, and foreboding ruin and disaster quite in their old fashion.

What's this? Yes, it is that highest of high tariff advocates, the Chicago *Inter-Ocean*, which remarked no longer ago than last Monday: "To the cost of freight is to be added the tariff duty which Mexico imposes upon imports, so that the United States price of an Ames shovel must be nearly double in a Mexican store." We thought that it had been claimed by high tariff papers over and over again that the cost of a tariff taxed article is not increased by the tax. But it makes a big difference, we suppose, whether the article paying a tariff tax is imported by some other country from the United States or by the United States from some other country.
