The World's Reason.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The World further says editorially, referring to the result: "The chief reason for this disaster is the want of adequate preparation for meeting the main issue. Eleven months were not time enough in which to enlighten the mass of thinking voters, educated for a full generation in the belief that taxes promote prosperity, and that a tariff regulates wages. Appreciating the enormous power of resistance in this inertia of ignorance, the World, questioned last June whether the president had not, in precipitating this issue so near to the beginning of an active campaign, done 'the right thing at the wrong time.' We commend his courage, but doubted his discretion."
