A TIE GAME.

The game of foot ball yesterday afternoon between O. Company of Eugene and G. Co. of this city proved a very interesting contest on the gridiron. Albany eleven had resolved on at least stopping the Eugene boys from scoring and their great game was therefore a defensive one, though at times their offensive play was fast and effective. In the very start after three minutes play through a cross trick play Saltmarsh carried the ball aided by splendid interference on the part of Coates past the goal line, but it was outside of bounds and was brought back in front of the goal, when Eugene succeeded in getting the ball and worked it out of danger. In the second half Eugene carried the ball to within a few feet of Albany's goal, when G. Company made a desperate struggle and secured the ball on downs, when it was taken back into the middle of the field, where it remained. There was about two inches of snow on the ground making the sphere very slippery and hence there were plenty of fumbles, particularly on the part of Albany at critical times. Good playing was done by all the Albany men, particularly Saltmarsh, Ed and Chas Stewart and Coates, whose work though would have been ineffective without the backing from the line. Lack of team work was the fault. McDaniel seemed to do the most effective work for Eugene. Prof. Burden, of Eugene, and Rev. Stevenson, of this city, were umpire and referee and Capt. Williams and J. A. Finch timekeepers.
