CITY COUNCIL.

Present—Mayor Davis, Recorder Van Winkle, Marshal Coates, Street Superintendent Wagsfall, Treasurer Parker, Chief Engineer Stewart, Poundmaster, Catlin and Councilmen Whitney, Daniels, Ralston, Dawson, Veal and Seeley.

The following bills were ordered paid: S. W. Ross, \$4.00; J. S. Van Winkle, \$8.10; A. Whitestone, \$3.00; M. G. Stetter, \$1.34; N. C. Newman, .40; F. M. Westfall, \$8.00; Hammel & Streitel, \$3.50; Albany Elec. Light Co., \$114.00; Dubrault Harness Co., \$1.50.

The report of F. J. Miller on needed repairs for the bridge, was read, showing: It should be painted and iron work given two coats of boiled linseed oil, but this need not be done for a year, estimated cost \$1500. The bridge needs re-flooring, in fact this is a necessity, new counter braces and rods, fellow guards, about 30 new piles, and new bents at ends of the approaches. The lumber will cost \$1122 and the work about \$928 a total of \$2100. This will put the bridge in good condition for two or three years, when other new piles will be needed and some other wood work replaced.

The petition of Jones and King for sewer was granted.

Upon motion the marshal was requested to go to the saloons and ask that no liquor be sold to a certain young man of the city.

The compensation of toll keepers on bridge was placed at \$85 each.

L. Wood, J. C. Devine, D. T. Wyman, George Markhart, J. R. Forgy, Wm. Rainwater, Geo. P. Warner, T. B. and W. A. Williamson. On the first ballot W. O. Breckenridge received 5, George Markhart 5, D. T. Wyman, Harlan Hubert 1, Breckenridge and Markhart were declared elected.

The matter of repairing the bridge was ordered placed in the hands of the committee on streets and public property.

The tolling of the bridge was ordered begun next Monday morning at 6 o'clock.
