The State Fair

The fair is much better than ever be-
 fore is the verdict. The exhibits are
 large and complete, the county exhibits
 being a feature.
 In the races yesterday Ollie won the
 two year old pace, best time 2:28.
 Saxe line won the class trot, best time
 2:29 1/2.
 The free for all trot was won by Ned
 Thorn, best time 2:26.
 The Oregonian says of the Linn
 county exhibit:
 The Linn County exhibit was pre-
 pared by J. R. Douglas and W. A. East-
 ham, of Albany, with the aid of their
 wives and Mrs. E. B. Smith, of Albany,
 and numerous Linn County farmers.
 They have on display 65 varieties of
 grain, 35 of grasses, 21 of potatoes, 74 of
 jellies, 200 of canned fruit, making 274
 different kinds of fruit in cans, 20 vari-
 eties of squashes, 9 of onions, 14 of mel-
 ons, 52 of apples and 72 of seeds. There
 is a shelf full of bottles of fruit juices,
 wines and brandy. There is a sample
 of Siberian oats, of which John Lennox,
 of Albany, grew 596 bushels on four
 acres. Another splendid product of the
 Lennox farm is shown in a sample of
 Dawson Golden Chaff wheat, which pro-
 duced 50 bushels per acre. Some Bo-
 hemian wheat, produced by H. Kinger,
 of Crabtree, is also shown. It yields 45
 bushels per acre, by measure, and each
 sack weighed out 25 pounds extra
 weight. The Linn County exhibit is
 prettily arranged, the grain and grasses
 being particularly ornamental to the
 booth. An orange tree, owned by Mrs.
 Ed Goin, of Albany, is one of the at-
 tractions of this booth.
