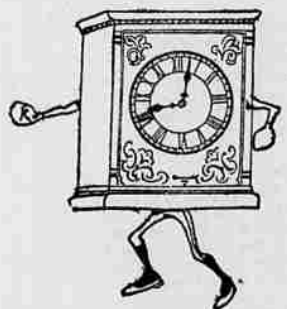

### Mr. Hermann's Non-Political Reception.

A good many Albany people, who have known Hon. Binger Hermann for eighteen or twenty years were present at the Alco Club parlors last evening at an informal reception tendered him. Mr. Hermann spoke pleasantly of his former relationship to Albany people, how he assisted in nominating James Elkins for secretary of state thirty three years ago, and how eighteen years ago he received the hearty support of the Linn county delegates, and then of the bright prospects of Oregon in the future. He was followed by Hon. J. K. Weatherford, Mayor Davis, Capt. Winn, C. O. Hogue and Postmaster Train. Incidentally there was a shoulder striking reference to the manner in which the government has been treating our own timber land claimants. Though non-political the reception as a matter of fact was undoubtedly the initial one in the interest of Mr. Hermann for congressman, and he no doubt will be received in as many places as possible in a non-political manner, which the better brings out the service Mr. Hermann has done for Oregon while in Congress and hence the appropriateness of his return there.
