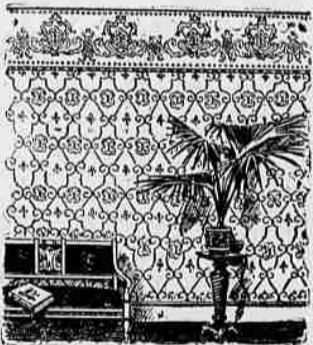

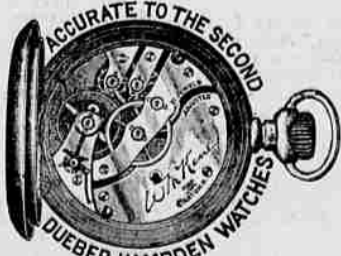

A fire and work team was reported purchased at a cost of \$300 for the horses, \$80 for the wagon and \$1 for the harnesses.

The report of the chief of police showed 68 arrests for the quarter, 7 locked up without charges, 7 drunk and disorderly, 4 disturbing peace, 3 on suspicion, 2 giving liquor to minors, 1 selling without license, 3 runaway boys, and 79 meals furnished at jail.

Poundmaster Catlin reported \$320 collected on dogs, every dog paid up.

Bids were ordered advertised for sidewalk along residence property of Wm. Vance.

Leaves of absence were granted Councilman Raiston, Recorder Van Winkle and Superintendent Westfall.

The contract for a sewer across Lafayette street was let to H. O. Harkness at \$80 and across Thurston street at 60c.

The salary of a teamster was placed at \$40 per month. Applicants for the position were A. L. Esters, Robert Brown, Oscar Reed and Arch Robinson. Robinson received 3 to Reed's 2 and was declared elected.

The engineer was authorized to purchase hay for the team.

A nuisance at the corner of Water and Sherman streets was ordered abated.

A cement cross walk was authorized built on the north side of 4th street at Ellsworth.

A mandate from the supreme court was ordered procured in the case of the city agt. Harper Oranor.

Petition of Southern Carnival Co. for the refunding of \$25 of license was dismissed and the city attorney was directed to collect \$8 due for cleaning the streets according to agreement, which they did not do.

For a Fair Exhibit.

J. R. Douglas is pushing his work for an exhibit for the state fair, and the farmers of the county should respond with their best. It should be remembered that this exhibit also will go to the St. Louis fair next year, and a medal there will mean something. Let Lion county get some of the St. Louis exhibit prize. With another boy he was in a boat when the waves of a passing steamer struck the boat and threw him out and he was drowned in the sight of a good many people before assistance could be rendered him.

Mrs. M. Graser died at her home in this city this morning of consumption at the age of 27 years. She leaves a husband and one child of her own and two step-children. She was a member of the Catholic church. She came to Albany from the east about a year ago. The funeral will be held at the Catholic church Friday forenoon at 10 o'clock.
