#### No Race.

#### Was Not Killed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—A decidedly new turn in the case of United States Vice-Consul William C. Magelssen, at Beirut, Syria, who was reported to have been assassinated last Sunday, developed tonight, when it became known that the report was incorrect and that, although Mr. Magelssen had been shot at, he had not even been injured. This information came to the State Department tonight in a dispatch from United States Minister Leishman at Constantinople.

#### Bold Robber.

M FARLAND, Kan., Aug. 28.—At one o'clock this morning six masked men, each heavily armed, appeared at the Rock Island depot here, and forced an entrance and, after taking their money and watches, beat the railroad men into insensibility. They then rifled the depot and going up hurriedly to the eating-house held up and took all the valuables from half a dozen men on the platform employed at the roundhouse and a part of the train crew.  
The bandits secured eight watches and probably \$150.

#### Oregon Delegation Turned Down.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The prolonged clash between Secretary Hitchcock, on the one side, and the Oregon (delegation on the other, over the appointment of a Register of the La Grande Land Office terminated today, with the appointment of E. W. Davis, the man favored by the Secretary and who was refused support by the delegation.

#### The Turkish War.

SOFIA, Aug. 28.—The general situation in the vilayet of Adrianople continues alarming. The revolutionaries have destroyed all the Turkish posts along the frontier.

#### A Town Flooded.

OMAHA, Aug. 28.—The town of Fort Crook City, seven miles from here, is under water, which is five feet deep in many homes. Only five houses remain on dry ground, and the Missouri Pacific station is partly submerged. The sudden flood was caused by a cloudburst above here.

#### Serious Charges.

ROSEMUNG, Aug. 28.—Constable H. C. Slocum returned last night from Myrtle Creek, where he served warrants for the arrest of W. P. Johnson and his six employees, Joseph and David Thornton, Walter Newton, Charles Steiner, Andrew Sherman and J. Riddonbush. The charge is intentionally blowing up the dam at Potts Bros' sawmill on South Myrtle Creek.
