#### A Heppner Letter.

HEPPER, Sept. 14, 1903, Since my last letter I have had the country, and to say that it was dusty would be speaking lightly. Some places the dust would fog up so that you could not see your team. In one of those places I had not seen my team or the road for some time, when I run up against something and had to wait until the dust cleared away, when I found out I had collided with a back. We could not see each other and when we collided we hallooed at each other but the dust was so thick, our voices could not penetrate it and our tongues would get clogged and so we just watted until the dust drifted away, then passed by each other. In some of those places when you looked back, it looked like a tunnel. Most of the ranchers here haul water and 1 met several two, four and six horse teams with portable wells filled with water from the greeks.

I have met the following people here in Heppner lately, formerly of Albany: Henry Settlemeir, Omar Hendricson, Billy Garrett, Mack Monteith, John Huston, Mrs. Farwell, F. Kenton and family, Mrs. Mills and son Ed- and Mr. Phelps and sons.

Last week it was very windy and the dust was terrific and as thick as republican candidates will be in Linn county since Hermann carried it.

Friday night it began to rain and rained all night and steady all day Satur-day. A regular Webfoot March day and Sunday the hills back of Heppner about 10 miles was all covered with the beautifortable.

The Heppner coal mines are running a large force of men and getting out a \$3,50 per ton at the mine and \$7.50 de-

livered in Heppner.
