A \$10,000 SUIT

Is to Be Brought Against Albany.

E. A. Truelove, of Tallman, has employed M. A. Butler, a Portland lawyer, to prosecute a suit against the city of Albany for \$10,000 damages. The complaint is in Albany ready to be verified by the plaintiff upon his coming to the city, when it will be served. In its issue of March 30 the DEMOCRAT gave an account of the accident, resulting in the suit, as follows:

On December 6 E. A. Truelove, of Tallman, a bridge carpenter on the Southern Pacific, injured a foot with an ax and was taken to the Portland Hospital for treatment getting out recently and returning home. Last evening he was brought to the city in a buggy to return to his work on the road, intending to go to tunnel number nine. After getting a lantern he started to walk to the 11:35 train. While passing in front of the property at the southeast corner of Lyon and Second Streets he fell through a hole, caused by a board being out, injuring the old wound so that it was necessary for him to be sent back to the Portland hospital this morning. Dr. Trimble attended him and he left for Portland on the morning train.

There are said to be a dozen holes in half a block at the place where he fell, to which the attention of the street superintendent and committee has been called several times. There is talk of a suit for damages.

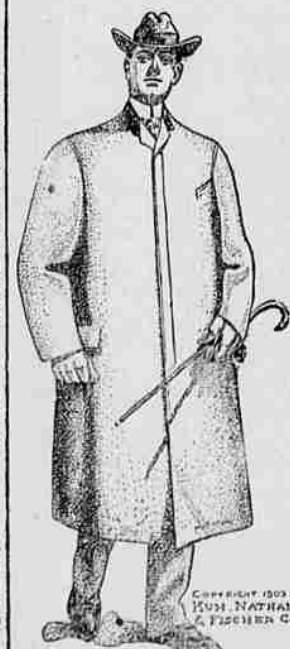
