THE TOTAL ASSESSMENT

For 1903 Shows a Big Increase Over 1902.

County Assessor McKnight has completed his trial balance of the assessment roll for 1903, showing an increase over last year of \$1,385,486. This comes mostly from non-tillable or timber land and railroad beds and rolling stock, the right direction. Following are the figures:

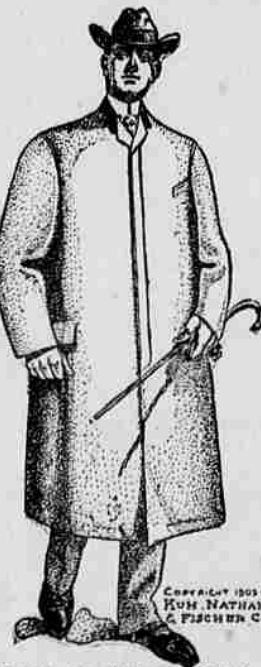
