San Wa Buried.

The remains of San Wa, the laundryman, were taken to their last resting place in the city cemetery, leaving Second street at 2 o'clock, this afternoon. The Celestials conducted the burial in the customary Mongolian style with numerous ceremonies for keeping the devil away, leaving enough things at the grave to keep him till he gets across the river Charon. It has been reported that Sa Wa died destitute, not leaving enough for the immediate needs of his wife and nine children, and that an effort was being made to get rid of his children. A Chinaman, who claimed to know, stated that he left about \$2,000. He has been the only Chinese laundryman here for a number of years, and is supposed to have done a good business, years ago, a very large one. Nevertheless a collection was taken up among the Chinamen in Portland and \$43.50 raised for funeral expenses, and waiting for this was the cause of the delay in the burial.

Arrested for Assault.

From the Junction Times. L. O. Morgan was arrested Monday on complaint of Archie Potter, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. A preliminary trial was held before Justice Clark and he was bound over in the sum of \$250. The state was represented by G. F. Skipworth, acting deputy district attorney, and defense by H. H. Hewitt, of Albany. Morgan said he could secure bail at Albany and he was accompanied to that city by Constable Nichols where he put up cash. The row occurred in front of the residence of J. J. Butler and while but a few words passed between Morgan and Potter, jealousy is supposed to be the cause of the trouble.

Died in Illinois.

The following from the Galesburg, Ill., Evening Mail, tells of the death of a former Albany woman, mother of the Misses Howard, for five years in the millinery business here:

After a long illness of typhoid fever, Mrs. Elizabeth Howard of East Galesburg passed away at 2 o'clock Saturday morning, Dec. 5, aged 78 years and 20 days.

Elizabeth Craft was born in Pennsylvania Nov. 15, 1825, and came to Illinois in her girlhood day. She was married to John Howard in 1849. To this union were born eight children, two having died in infancy. One daughter, Cassie, died nearly three years ago. There remain to mourn the loss of this dear and loved mother these children: F. C. of Maquon, Emmet, Delbert and Ella of East Galesburg, and Susan of Hillsburg, Wash.

The husband and father died when the son, F. C., the oldest child, was only 15 years old, so the great responsibility of bringing up these children all fell on the mother.

She most nobly did her duty, always instilling into her children truthfulness, honesty and temperance. She was a woman of much intellectual ability and was noted for her kind hospitality toward her neighbors and friends and her kindness toward all dumb animals. A noble woman, a self-sacrificing mother, has gone to her reward. She united with the Methodist church in her girlhood days and ever retained her faith in her savior. Her last words were: "I want you all to pray for me."

Destitute Chinese Family.

There is little doubt that the late San Wa left nothing for his family notwithstanding contrary reports. In fact they are without the necessities of life, and friends are assisting in their support. An effort is being made to get a place in the Chinese boys and girls home in Portland, in charge of the Presbyterian church, and Mrs. W. S. Holt is expected in Albany to look after the case.

Tarred and Feathered at Corvallis.

CREFFIELD AND MAUD HURT MARRIED.

F. E. Creffield and Maud Hurt were united in marriage at the court house at 11:20 o'clock this forenoon by Judge H. M. Palmer. Frank C. Hart and wife Mollie, were the witnesses. These are members of the famous band of Holy Rollers of Corvallis, about which there has been so much talk, of whom Creffield is chief. This is one chapter.

Last night the most sensational chapter in the mummy story was enacted. About 10 o'clock a band of about twenty prominent Corvallis men crossed the river on the ferry boat, took Creffield and his fellow apostle Brooks, conveyed them to a place near the saw mill, near Corvallis, where they stripped them and applied a liberal dose of tar and feathers and then permitted them to return home, which they did and spent the remainder of the night in cleansing themselves, but not so well but what the tar could be smelled on Creffield this forenoon when married. Brooks skipped out, but Creffield seems to have appreciated one of the things the people objected to, the free love part of the establishment, which has been disgracing the outfit and as well the entire community, and early this morning left for Albany resolved in getting that much out of the way.

The Democrat has received a private letter from a Corvallis friend, who was probably one of the crowd who manipulated the tar, who confirms the above. When covered with tar and feathers they were told that if they ever came back again they would wake up some morning dangling to a telegraph pole. Creffield wanted to pray, but they told him he had done enough of that. Then he said: "Lord forgive them they know not what they do. Two are reported insane from the doings, one already in the asylum, besides all the things destroyed. During the tarring the women followed praying and singing.

This afternoon the couple and Mr. and Mrs. Hurt got in their back and left for the Beach farm, where they will do well to behave themselves, as there is said to be more tar and feathers left.

The presbytery of the U. P. church of Oregon met at the U. P. church this afternoon to consider the matter of the trouble in the Portland Grand Ave. church between Rev. J. H. Gibson and W. E. Spicer and the other elders of the church.

Present, Revs. J. H. Gibson, A. W. Wilson, J. A. Speer and J. H. Leeper, Elders Hugh Nesbit and W. L. Loughton of Portland; Rev. W. D. Howin and Elder W. H. McCormick of Shedd, Rev. A.
