The trial of J. F. Venner and Percy E. Hume, the two Brownville druggists yesterday, on the charge made under a city ordinance of selling liquor without a physician's prescription, was one of the most exciting in the history of the city. DEATH OF J. H. WALLACE.

J. H. Wallace, a well known pioneer resident of Linn county, died last evening at his home near this city, after a lingering illness.

He was born in Baltimore, Md., June 23, 1837 and came to California during the gold excitement and afterwards to Oregon in the '50's settling near Albany. He resided on the same farm thirty years. A few years ago he came to Albany and opened a store in the third ward, which he ran for some time. He was a member of the Grange and is well spoken of as a father, husband and citizen.

Mrs. Wallace died seven years ago. He leaves seven children: Capt. C. W. Wallace, Mrs. S. S. Bodine and Mrs. C. C. Parsons of and near this city, Frank Wallace of Santa Rosa, Calif., Ed. Wallace of Astoria, Will Wallace of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Ralph Wallace of Little Rock, Ark.

The funeral service will be held tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the residence of the deceased in Elkins addition and will be conducted by Rev. Bower.
