A Jap Boat Sunk. Tokio, May 13.—The Japanese torpedobat No., 48 was destroyed while removing mines from Keer Bay, north of Talien Wan, yesterday. Seven men were killed and seven were wounded. This is the first war vessel Japan has lost in the war.

BERLIN, May 14.—It is rumored in diplomatic circles here that there is a strong possibility of an attempt being made to end the war in the Far East soon. The rumor, which is circumstantial in character declares the war party in Russia has urged the Czar to end the war.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—F. A. Hyde and Henry P. Dimond. both of this city, were today held for trial at Washington, D. C., on an indictment found by the Federal grand jury of the District of Columbia, charging Hyde and Diamond with conspiracy to defraud the United States Government by illegally acquiring title to public lands in Oregon and other Coast States.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 13.—After sitting for more than 12 hours, and taking 15 ballots, in which none of the seven aspirants gained or lost in the materially, the Illinois Republican Convention adjourned late tonight without nominating a man for Governor.


