The Doings of the Entire World

A Jap Boat Sunk.

TOKIO, May 13.—The Japanese torpedo boat No. 48 was destroyed while removing mines from Keer Bay, north of Taitien Wan, yesterday. Seven men were killed and seven were wounded. This is the first war vessel Japan has lost in the war.

For Peace.

BERLIN, May 14.—It is rumored in diplomatic circles here that there is a strong possibility of an attempt being made to end the war in the Far East soon. The rumor, which is circumstantial in character declares the war party in Russia has urged the Czar to end the war.

Held for Trial.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—F. A. Hyde and Henry P. Dimond, both of this city, were today held for trial at Washington, D. C., on an indictment found by the Federal grand jury of the District of Columbia, charging Hyde and Dimond with conspiracy to defraud the United States Government by illegally acquiring title to public lands in Oregon and other Coast States.

Could Not Nominate.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 13.—After sitting for more than 12 hours, and taking 15 ballots, in which none of the seven aspirants gained or lost in the material, the Illinois Republican Convention adjourned late tonight without nominating a man for Governor.

Knocked Out.

STOCKTON, Cal., May 13.—A. J. Johnson, member of Lodge of Elks at Portland, lies in a hospital here in a very serious condition, his mind is wandering and high fever burning within him. Johnson is victim of knockout drops administered in a nearby mountain town by a young thug who subsequently robbed him.

Judge Boise's Sister.

SALEM, Or., May 13.—The funeral of Miss Elizabeth Boise, who died here yesterday morning, was conducted this afternoon from the residence of Judge R. P. Boise. Interment was had in City View Cemetery.

Deceased was born in Blandford, Maine, in 1826.

Fine Mining Prospects.

Mr. George Heilman this week received a report from Herbert Leigh, manager of the Fairview group of mines in the Bohemia district, giving particulars of the running into a big ledge of rich ore in the Miscellaneous mine one hundred feet earlier than had been anticipated, which is being gotten out preparatory to the installation of a mill in this mine this year. The ore is much richer than that of the Musick owned by the Portland Co., which has produced such paying results. Development work has been very satisfactory, but is not yet complete, and the company have decided to put on the market 40,000 more shares at 4 cents to keep the work going before the mill starts up in the summer. Reports from Bohemia indicate one of the best mining camps in the world in the future.

Three Holley Horses

Belonging to Pleasant Robnett, of Holley, were missing Friday morning. One had been in his barn and two in a pasture. It was thought they might have been stolen, but this morning they were found coming towards home on the Foster road, indicating that the horses had probably simply run off on their own account.

A Road Master's Trip.

Roadmaster D. D. Hackleman returned last evening from Jordan, where he made arrangements to put to work the new rock crusher. The old one will be used beyond Lebanon, and the steam roller, expected next week, will be put into active operations as soon as possible, good use being made of the machines.

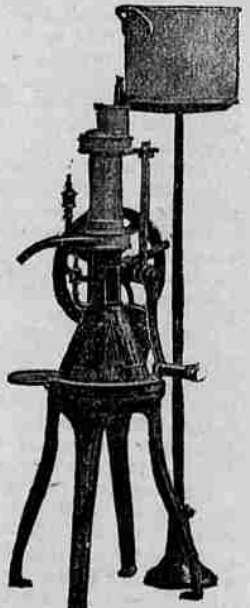
