The Doings of the Entire World

A Japanese Victory.

TOKIO, June 25.—Admiral Togo reports an engagement at Port Arthur last Thursday in which a battleship of the Peresviet type and a battleship of the Sevastopol type and a first-class cruiser of the Diana type were damaged. The Japanese fleet was practically undamaged.

Forces Combined.

LIAO YANG, June 24.—It is reported that Generals Oku and Kuroki have joined forces and will attack from the direction of Vafangow. There is talk of a serious engagement shortly. It is also rumored that the Japanese forces which were recently advancing in this direction have fallen back on Feng Wang Cheng. The value of the trouble has now returned to the normal.

Perdicaris Free.

TANGIER, June 25.—Ion Perdicaris and Cromwell Varley, who were captured by the bandit Raisuli, have just arrived. Perdicaris was greatly pleased with the reception accorded him by the townsmen, who met him in great numbers.

Before Port Arthur.

CHICAGO, June 24.—A special to the Daily News from Chefoo says: Another demonstration took place off Port Arthur yesterday. Firing began from the forts about 10 a. m. and continued until 10 p. m. The program was about the same as on the previous day.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—A sweeping change in the Cabinet of President Roosevelt was announced official at the White House today. The announcement came as follows: The following Cabinet appointments are announced: William H. Moody, of Massachusetts, Attorney-General. Paul Morton of Illinois, Secretary of the Navy. Victor H. Metcalf of California, Secretary of Commerce and Labor.

Kansas Storms

TOPEKA, June 24.—Heavy rain, wind and hail tonight seriously damaged the wheat crop in the central portion of the state. Lindsborg and Junction City report that large fields of wheat have been flattened by the storm. A small tornado in Concordia unroofed many buildings.
