The Doings of the World

The War
ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 20.—Acute anxiety prevails regarding the situation at Port Arthur, on account of the desperate character of the fighting reported as taking place, although the War Office does not seem to believe that danger of the fall of the fortress is as imminent as is generally asserted. According to advices received by the War Office, there is still an ample supply of ammunition and provisions there.

Chicago Wheat.
CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—Buying-panic number 33 struck the Chicago wheat trade at the opening today. Sensational changes in prices are so frequent these days that the trade and the public are getting used to it. The highest prices of the year, on the renewal of the sensational advance in wheat, were reserved for the closing hour today, when September wheat, sold at \$1.10 1-2, December at \$1.12 1-2 and May at \$1.15 7-8, 4 cents and 5 cents over the close yesterday.

Won't Run.
NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Elihu Root has made it so plain to Republican leaders, both National and state, that he will not accept the Republican nomination for Governor of New York that those who are in a position to know are confident that he will not be named for the place.

Burned Out.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 19.—Twenty-three small children, 12 adults and a badly singed cat (which is much "better than it looks") are homeless on Fourth Plain, near Vancouver, Wash.,—burned out by the fierce forest fire of the past week. Few of the unfortunate people had much in the way of worldly goods.

Fatal Storms.
EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 19.—A cloudburst at Globe, Ariz., has resulted in seven deaths and the destruction of much property. Wires to the section affected are down. The Southern Pacific shops were demolished. The cloudburst is the worst Arizona has experienced in 20 years. There are seven known victims of the storm.

A Tornado.
ST. LOUIS, Aug. 19.—A tornado of extreme fury swept down upon the residence portion of North St. Louis late today, resulting in the death of one person, injury to probably 50, and damage to property estimated at \$100,000.

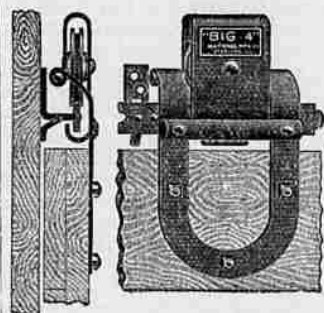
