TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Doings of the World

After Frightful Experiences. ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10.—It seems to be established definitely that Field Marshall Oyama's tired troops on Wednesday abandoned the attempt to head off General Kurapatkin, whose army arrived safely at Mukden, after frightful experiences, floundering in the mud and mire over the Manchurian roads. Descriptions of the scenes along the line or retreat are almost incredible. They tell how men lay down in the mud and slept in a drenching rain. It is evident that the last determined effort of the Japanese to bring Kurapatkin to bay was made on Tuesday.

A Mukden Rain. MUKDEN, Sept. 9.—This evening around Mukden has occurred the greatest downpour of rain of the whole campaign, and with it a terrifying accompaniment of thunder and lightning. There has been the greatest difficulty in preventing the cavalry horses stampeding and all the horselines have been tied. The men are scarcely able to keep their feet among the moving horses.

Russian Uprising. ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10.—Intense activity is being displayed by some Russophobic revolutionary organizations abroad. It seems that they have united in an effort to appeal to all the discontented classes of the Russian population. Incendiary proclamations have been smuggled across the border and distributed broadcast in the towns and cities, especially in Polish and Jewish centers.

A Hillsboro Burglary. HILLSBORO, Sept. 9.—Safelowers entered the Postoffice in this city last night and took \$320 in money and \$700 and \$800 in 1-cent and 2-cent stamps. The robbers entered the office through a rear window by boring a hole through the sash and unfastening the safety lock. Then they drilled the safe which was a more or less antiquated affair, being a plate depository, and blew the door successfully.

A Train Wreck. PORTSMOUTH, Va., Sept. 9.—Four persons were killed and 35 were injured early today when a train on the Sea-Air Line railroad, consisting of an express-car, mailcar, two day coaches and a sleeping-car was derailed at a trestle just south of Catawba River, in South Carolina, and was run into by a locomotive and caboose that followed.

Ate Strychnine. PHILMATH, Or., Sept. 9.—After eating sugar-coated strychnine pills, the 3-year-old child of Walter Howell, a laborer at the Benton county sawmill, 7 miles west of here, died last night after intense suffering.
