## TRAIN WRECKED.

### One Killed and Several Injured.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—A special from Lind, Wash., says the North Coast Limited on the Northern Pacific was wrecked near there this morning. Four cars were derailed, one passenger killed and several injured.

### Jumped His Bail.

WALLA WALLA, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—The Circuit Court of appeals today affirmed the lower court sentencing Adam Schmidt to eight years imprisonment in the Federal Prison for naturalization fraud. Schmidt was out on \$5,000 bonds. The officers who went to notify him found he had disappeared several days ago.

### A Big Wedding.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Pauline Astor, the only daughter of William Waldorf Astor, and Captain Spender-Clay were married in St. Margaret, Westminster at 1 o'clock this afternoon by the Bishops of London and Ripon and the Archbishop of London. The presents received by the bride were valued at several hundred thousand dollars.

### Home Mission Day.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 29.—Hundreds of prominent church workers and missionaries were present at the opening of the Home Mission celebration in Festival Hall today. The session will continue through Saturday and Sunday.

### Received by the President.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—President Roosevelt this afternoon received the members of the British Iron and Steel Institute, who are returning to their home from St. Louis.

### John Mitchell Day.

WILKESBARRE, Pa. Oct. 29.—Reports from all towns in the anthracite district show that a general observance of "John Mitchell Day" took place.

### Russians Whipped.

TOKIO, Oct. 29.—A press telegram from General Kuroki's headquarters reports that on Thursday the Japanese captured Waitaoshan after sharp fighting. The attack began at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, the Russians retreating. The Japanese captured two machine-guns.

### At Port Arthur.

TOKIO, Oct. 28.—It is reported that the Japanese opened a desperate general attack on the eastern forts of the Keekwan group, north of Port Arthur, during the morning of Oct. 26, and silenced the Russian batteries. A shell exploded the Russian magazines.

### Chairman Cowherd's Claims.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The Sun today says: Chairman Cowherd, chairman of the Democratic Congressional Committee, will soon issue a prediction that the Democrats are certain to carry 50 doubtful districts, giving the party a clear working majority in the House of Representatives in the Fifty-ninth Congress.

### A Bad Explosion.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Oct. 28.—The most terrific explosion in the history of coal mining in Colorado occurred at Mine No. 3, of the Rocky Mountain Fuel and Iron Co., at Tercio, 240 miles west of Trinidad, at 1:30 this afternoon, and the number of dead is variously placed between 30 and 60 men.

### Being Fixed Up.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—War between Russia and Great Britain has been averted and the settlement of the points in dispute regarding the attack by the Russian second Pacific squadron on British trawlers on October 21 has been referred to an international commission under The Hague convention.

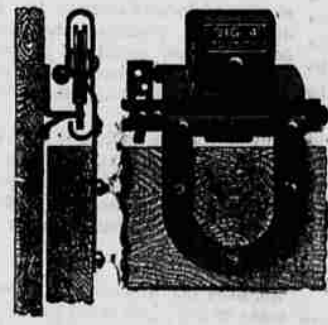
