Petition of J. P. Wallace et al asked that barn of W. B. Gilson be placed in sanitary condition, granted and nuisance was ordered abated.

Two petitions for permission to enter city with telephone lines were filed.

Ordinance bill granting H. Hecktor, W. S. Pate, N. H. Bateman, F. J. Denny and A. Hendricson trustees, privilege of erecting poles and wires for telephones in city, except on First street, was read three times and passed unanimously. Work is to begin within 6 months, and the franchise is good for ten years and cannot be sold or assigned.

An ordinance was read providing for the prevention of livery barns, feed stables and corrals from the keeping of stallions south of third street. Referred.

The ordinance providing for a flat salary of \$75 per month for the recorder was called up. Recorder Van Winkle upon a question of privilege spoke upon the move as against the interests of the present system of government. The Mayor spoke against the ordinance. Upon motion the ordinance was referred: Ayo-Dawson, Huston, Marshall and the Mayor, No-Ralston, Stewart, and Tomlinson. Some warm talk followed without further action.

A curb was ordered along property of Peter Riley.

Saloon license was granted Kroeschel Bros. and R. F. Pomeroy.

Proceedings against Mr. and Mrs. Tillotson for construction of walks were ordered completed.

Councilman Stewart was instructed to purchase a \$100 wheel grader for the city.

A. J. Carothers spoke personally for a new sidewalk and also for drainage in the right direction.
