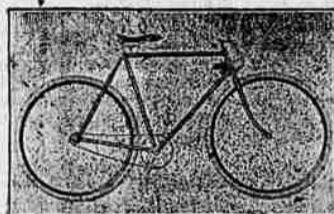

Consequently dispatches appearing in America saying that Foreign Minister Delcasse and Dr. Motono, the Japanese Minister to France, have been conferring at the former's house relative to peace are inaccurate.

Japs Advancing.

ST. PETERSBURG, Mar. 31.—The news from the front today indicates that Field Marshal Oyama has begun a genuine advance of his main army, with wings far extended. Heavy reconnaissances are being made against the Russian center, with the object of enveloping the Russian position.
